- 3. Take the initiative to build relationships with people and groups in the wider community beyond your congregation. Refuse to be isolated. Take to the streets, the coffee shops, library and parks of your community. Be curious about what's going on. Get involved in community events. Meet people. Introduce yourself as a member of the church. Invite people to "come and see."
- **4.** Accept responsibility for mistakes, learn from them, and in all things, let grace abound. Christians aren't perfect; they are forgiven. So making mistakes is not the worst thing that can happen. Besides we often learn the most from our failures. In the end, and in the beginning, it is about God's grace, not our achievements. Cut others some slack. While you're at it, cut yourself some, too.
- 5. "Always be prepared to give an account of the hope that is within you." (1 Peter 3:15) Look for where the love, energy and life are flowing and focus on that. And recognize excuses for what they are: a sign of insufficient commitment. Be people of hope, trusting in God to find a way even when we can't.
- **6.** Be willing to let people go in order to stay focused on your core mission. It is more important for your church to be clear and steady about its core mission than it is to make everyone happy. Some people may be better off in another congregation. When folks are unhappy, connect, talk and pray. If things remain stuck, let them go with your blessing, giving priority to your mission.
- 7. Splash it on! A hospice nurse told the story of bringing an elderly woman home for the final days of her life. Noticing a large bottle of perfume on the woman's dresser, the nurse asked, "Would you like me to dab a bit of that behind your ears?" "Honeys" said the woman to the nurse, "Why don't you just plash it on!" God loves cheerful givers. So spend money wisely, well and freely in God's cause.

Let's look together for ways to embody these seven habits more every year! The UCC website has so much information about doing good ministry. If you find something that you'd like the rest of us to read, feel free to submit it for publication in an upcoming newsletter.

Happy New Year! Happy 'newness' in Jesus Christ, our brother, our Teacher, our Savior.

Angel Tree

Each year at Christmas time, Missions sponsors the Angel Tree program which assists families in need in providing a little more Christmas joy for their children. We had an amazing response to this year's Angel Tree outreach. Through your generous donations we were able to provide 106 gifts for folks in need. Our Congregation served 6 FPC families, including 16 children for which we gave 62 gifts. 

First Parish Congregational Church History

The oldest church in the immediate area, First Parish Church was founded by Scotch-Irish Presbyterians in the spring of 1719. Faith was and continues to be a priority. Worship was held one day after arrival, a church body was organized in one month and a building was built in 1722. A "more imposing structure" replaced the first in 1769, and although altered and expanded through time, the main building and sanctuary remain our center of worship.

First Parish Church became an independent community church in the Congregational tradition about 1810 as new settlers came to the area. Through the years the church has always had a strong instinct for both survival and faithfulness. In 1973 and again in 1985, we made major commitments to educational and community ministry through the additions of Noyes Hall and Currier Hall. We joined the United Church of Christ in 1995.
