



Calling all Middle and High School Students! Come join us after service for some good old-fashioned fun and laughter as we carve some pumpkins to show off at our Trunk or Treat event and take home after the event!

We are also planning a Youth Group Trip to Boston in the Spring for City Reach.



CityReach is an overnight urban outreach program begun in March 1996 for youth (with accompanying adults), young adults, and college students from churches of any denomination.

The program gives these young people the opportunity to learn first-hand about homelessness from people who have experienced it. During the 20 hour session, participants join CityReach staff in street ministry and offer hospitality, food and clothing. This is followed by times of sharing and reflection.

Board of Christian Outreach and Missions

<u>Zimbabwe Container:</u> Over the past couple of months the Board of Christian Outreach and Missions has been collecting humanitarian supplies for our sister Church in Zimbabwe. On September 9th we drove a truck load of supplies to Keene, NH where it was loaded into a large shipping container destined for Zimbabwe, Africa along with supplies from many other churches in New Hampshire. We will keep the Congregation informed of its progress as it makes its very long journey.

The Congregation donated 34 boxes of supplies consisting of Fabric, School Supplies, Medical Supplies, 1 Computer Printer, 2 Bicycles, and a guitar. We are also investigating purchasing a generator in Zimbabwe for our sister church.



<u>Disaster Relief:</u> The Board of Christian Outreach and Missions has sent funds to help in the relief efforts from the devastating effects of Hurricane Harvey in Texas (\$1000.00) and Hurricane Irma in Florida (\$500.00).

<u>Thanksgiving Baskets:</u> For many this is the hardest time of the year to get through and the time in which many of us need a helping hand. Each year the Board of Christian Outreach and Missions receives a list of names of people who need some extra help managing the holidays. Recipients are recommended to us through a number of organizations such as the Derry Community Caregivers, The Upper Room, and by word of mouth. If you know of anyone or any family that is in need of help this holiday season, please talk to Pastor Deborah so that we may add them to our list.

Missions will have a table setup in Currier hall on Sunday, November 5th and Sunday, November 12th. We will be providing grocery bags for collecting the Thanksgiving food along with any special instructions. Written on each bag will be one or more item(s) which we will need in order to complete a basket.

Food will be collected up to and including Saturday, November 18th. There will be collection baskets at the side entrance to the Church outside of Currier Hall. The baskets will be distributed to individuals/families on Sunday, November 19th. Thank you in advance for your generosity.

Board of Christian Outreach and Missions (Continued)

<u>Pinkerton Homeless Program:</u> The Board of Christian Outreach and Missions voted to add the Pinkerton Homeless Program to our list of Monthly donations. Last November Nancy Cofrin attended our service and answered questions concerning the program. In 2015 they helped approximately 100 homeless Pinkerton students. They can only accept donations of money since they have no storage capacity. They personally buy whatever the youth and the family needs: clothes, shoes, food, Christmas gifts, holiday dinner (all prepared at grocery store). They ask sizes, preferences, etc. If the parents sell the items they discontinue aid to that family. Cash is never given. If there is a food voucher there is no allowance for cigarettes or alcohol.

Project Linus: Linus NH Seacoast would like to thank FPC parishioners for gathering on Sunday, 9/24/17 to make blankets for children and teens who have experienced a trauma. Everyone was enthusiastic. We learned some things and accomplished a lot. Many thanks to Jennifer V. for leading us. Donations of handmade blankets can be dropped off at FPC, to the bin labeled, "Project Linus" just outside of the office. We plan to have this event periodically.

First Parish Congregational Church History

The oldest church in the immediate area, First Parish Church was founded by Scotch-Irish Presbyterians in the spring of 1719. Faith was and continues to be a priority. Worship was held one day after arrival, a church body was organized in one month and a building was built in 1722. A "more imposing structure" replaced the first in 1769, and although altered and expanded through time, the main building and sanctuary remain our center of worship.

First Parish Church became an independent community church in the Congregational tradition about 1810 as new settlers came to the area. Through the years the church has always had a strong instinct for both survival and faithfulness. In 1973 and again in 1985, we made major commitments to educational and community ministry through the additions of Noyes Hall and Currier Hall. We joined the United Church of Christ in 1995.
