From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Child of God,

In the United Church of Christ covenant language is inescapable. We use "covenant" as a noun. And we use is as a verb. It is a process **and** it can be a document. Mostly it is a choice. In the UCC we choose covenant.

In the Bible "covenant" is most certainly a root theme of scripture. It occurs in many places and times, but never in precisely the same shape. Who initiates covenant -human beings or God? Can covenant be refused?

Historically in the congregational tradition, "covenant" has strong historical meaning. The framers of the American Constitution were steeped in this tradition and shaped our government by their understanding of covenant. They understood that a covenant: a. defines a people; b. creates a body politic (the "incarnational statement"); c. describes common goals and values; and d. outlines the institutions through which the people will act collectively.

Biblical covenants do the same thing. The major difference is that Biblical covenants are instituted by God; historical covenants are instituted by people. The quintessential covenant statement is: "I will be your God, and you will be my people." So what does it mean to be in covenant as a people, not as individuals? Especially since many people have come to the UCC from other, more hierarchical denominations, or from a position of being un-churched, or from congregational churches that behaved in a contract mentality. We simply cannot assume that the concept of covenant is equally understood.

"Friend, you enter this church not as a stranger, but as a guest of God. Come, then, with joy in your heart and thanks upon your lips, and offer God today your love and your service."

- Adapted from a 12th Century Church in Hampshire, England



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The biggest differences between a "contract" and a "covenant" is that a contract is based on law and built on fear; it limits; the accountability may be one-sided; and it requires no other attention in order to remain enforceable. Whereas a covenant is based on grace, which demands forgiveness; is built on love; nourishes – i.e. is life-giving in the way that the sacrament of Communion is life-giving; the sense of accountability is always mutual; and requires (re-) affirmation in order to live into its promise.

Congregational churches can maintain their integrity as covenantal churches when the responsibility is shared by both the pastors and the congregation. All parties come to the table with a willingness to speak their truth and listen to the beloved Other; express their vision for the church and listen to the beloved Other; take responsibility for their mistakes and forgive the beloved Other for their mistakes, when they, in turn, have taken responsibility for theirs. This is church: mutuality of humanness connected to the Divine.

Let us be mindful of our Covenantal relationship as we embrace 2016 and walk boldly into the Vision that God has for us here in East Derry.

As always, I thank God for you every single day.

"TRY A TITHE SUNDAY" – JUNE 19, 2016 With Joy and Thanksgiving!

In an effort to connect with discipleship and faith practices, the focus of Try a Tithe Sunday is to invite and encourage each household to grow toward a tithe, to a tithe and beyond a tithe as they have been blessed.

Stewardship is more than just giving to a budget. Living and growing as faithful stewards means that we give of our Time, our Talents, and our Treasures with Joy and Thanksgiving. Stewardship is a statement of faith that who we are and everything we have, not just possessions, but all of creation, belongs to God. Stewardship is an act of worship, an expression of our faith in God our creator, redeemer, and sustainer, and a discipline for spiritual growth that helps us become the kind of faithful, grateful, generous people we want to be.

We want everyone to experience a taste of God's abundance, and what is possible when we become grateful and generous stewards of all that belongs to God, through

"Try a Tithe Sunday"

"Try a Tithe Sunday" an invitation for those who call First Parish Church their church home to try for one Sunday giving one week's tithe (10 percent of your household's net weekly income), on Sunday, June 19th.

What is "Try a Tithe Sunday"? It is first an invitation for those to give one week's tithe on Sunday, June 19th (10 percent of net household weekly income). * "Try a Tithe Sunday" is above and beyond your regular weekly pledge. * The purpose is to demonstrate what our giving potential could be if every household in our church family tithed (gave 10%).

Why are we doing this? God's Work is accomplished on earth through tithes and offerings of God's people. By having a "Try a Tithe Sunday", we will experience the abundance of God's provision and witness the possibilities for ministry and mission. As we witness the resources available through being grateful and generous givers with the Tithe (10%), we become excited about what God can accomplish through us. Another reason we do this to have a starting point and plan to take steps toward becoming Tithers together.

How are we going to do "Try a Tithe Sunday"? You will be receiving a letter, spreadsheet, and a special "Try a Tithe" envelope two weeks prior to "Try a Tithe Sunday", June 19th (we will also have them available at church). Find your weekly giving level if you were to tithe and write a check for that amount, and put it into the "Try a Tithe" envelope and bring that to worship on June 19th to be added to your regular weekly pledge amount.

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What if I won't be in church that Sunday? If you can't attend church on Sunday, June 19th, please use one of these options:

- 1. Mail in your "Try a Tithe" envelope so it will arrive prior to June 19th.
- 2. Give your "Try a Tithe" envelope a week earlier.
- 3. Drop off your "Try a Tithe" envelope in the church office ahead of time.

What if I do not feel I am able to participate in "Try a Tithe Sunday". Or tithe? God calls us to give what we can, not what we can't. The Bible reminds us that God loves a cheerful giver. If you are unemployed, underemployed, in school, under the financial care of someone else, there may be no income to tithe. God's challenge in the Scripture is for each Christian to become a generous giver by giving our first and our best to Him. Council News

The Rehabilitation Fundraising Committee that is working on the external/community capital campaign has requested to hire a consultant to help them in their efforts. Due to the size of the contract the Church Council has recommended this come to the congregation for a special vote. On Sunday, March 6, 2016 at 11:45 there will be a special congregational meeting to approve the expenditure. The request is to borrow up to \$66,800 from the Capital Campaign/Rehabilitation funds, to be repaid with first funds raised by this committee.

There will also be a request to authorize the Council to open a line of credit up to \$400,000 as a bridge loan for the current portion of the project. Due to the timing of Capital Campaign contributions the cash flow could become an issue this summer to complete the planned project. Payment for any money borrowed would be paid with the future Campaign receipts.

This very successful program continues to grow and run smoothly. Several people have stepped forward recently to assist in the weekly re-loading process. Our weekly re-load order is running between \$1000 and \$3000 weekly, earning the church \$50-\$150/week – just to buy groceries we would buy anyway!

Building Advisory Committee

You have probably noticed that the top of the tower is no longer on the front lawn. Based on the advice of our timber frame contractor, we decided to have it dismantled and moved to storage at his warehouse facility/shop in Nottingham, NH. This process proved to be the best decision as much more rot and deterioration of the structure was present. Our weathervane, bell and all the pieces of the lantern and belfry are now secure and out of the weather.

Work to rebuild this intricate top structure will occur at the shop over the next 18 months. Repair of the tower base will take place in the summer of 2017. At the end of that summer, the restored top will return to its lofty home on the base (and the bell can ring again). The award of the LCHIP grant of \$125,000 is specifically intended for this tower rehabilitation work, which is expected to cost over \$300,000 when completed in 2017.

BAC has been working with Arron Sturgis, our timber framer, and Norman Larson, our architect, to prepare for the foundation project to begin in April. Simply put, the historic meetinghouse will be raised, a four foot crawl space excavated, sills and floor framing replaced/repaired, a new concrete foundation poured and the building lowered onto the new foundation. Occuring in conjunction with the foundation work will be the pouring of a foundation for a new connector building that will connect the Noyes building with the meetinghouse. This connector will house a modern elevator that will make our whole facility handicapped accessible. Much design work has been occuring with Norman Larson to develop the best plan to accomplish our goal of accessibility while preserving the historic nature and look of our facility. Plans for this work are currently going out to contractors for bid.

With the meetinghouse lift and rehab work required on the tower base, the organ pipes will be removed from the room in the tower behind the alter in order to protect them from damage and contamination. This will occur in April after Easter and means that the organ will not be useable until the tower is complete and the pipes are returned in the fall of 2017.

The last two months have been busy with disassembling, planning, designing, scheduling, preparing and addressing questions that arise. Soon we will be busy with the start of the foundation project. Stay tuned, things are going to become very exciting.




