For out of Zion shall go forth instruction and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem.

<sup>4</sup> He shall judge between the nations, and shall arbitrate for many peoples; they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore."

Can this be real? Is it too good to be true?

For the Israelites an escape from Pharaoh was too good to be true. The baby King who lived to become the Prince of Peace was too good to be true. God's own Word becoming flesh, so that we might know more wholly, more truly the miracle of God's love for us is too good to be true. AND THEY ARE ALL TRUE!

Let us embrace what it true: God's love. May we know God's love. May we act out God's love in the world. Let us learn war no more.

#### **Family Promise**

First Parish's participation in Family Promise continues, with about 10 people in our congregation regularly participating every 10th week when our turn to co-host comes around. One new twist which started with our last hosting slot, July 31-Aug 6, is that we will assume primary responsibility for finding volunteers for the week, rather than being a support church. We will still work with People's United, but it will be with them supporting us, rather than the reverse.

#### **The Derry Friendship Center**

With your charitable giving, Missions provides support to the Derry Friendship Center which is one of the charities that we support monthly. For over 30 years the Derry Friendship Center has provided a safe, confidential, alcohol and drug free environment for people seeking and/or maintaining recovery from substance abuse and to participate in activities and ongoing rehabilitative peer support to people in recovery from alcoholism and drug abuse. Missions has scheduled a "Missions Moment" on Sunday, August 14 and has invited Carol Bowden from the Friendship Center to talk to the Congregation concerning this important local mission.

#### Zimbabwe Pen-Pal

The Board of Christian Outreach and Missions is in the early phases of revitalizing the Pen-Pal program. Rev. Peyiye from our sister church in Dangamvura, Mutare, Zimbabwe has moved to the United States and it is not known at this time if Rev. Peyiye's replacement has been called yet. We have the name of a contact who will be able to connect us to the leaders of the Dangamvura Church so that we can continue to pursue this program. More will follow over the next few months.

#### Hannaford's Fundraiser Program

#### Stewardship Board

The Finance Committee meeting just adjourned. My mind is still reeling with figures and information. The balance sheet tallies up all those figures and makes sense out of all the chaos. Isn't bookkeeping wonderful to make the world look so neat and tidy? Our treasurer has what I would term an impossible job. I know at my house when it's the day to fill out the IRS Form 1040, I have a mountain of papers, somewhat formed into piles, sharp pencils, a BIG eraser, calculator and I feel a tension headache coming on. I'm sure glad that day comes only once a year! At First Parish Church right now we have not only the usual monthly expenses of keeping the church running but the Capital Campaign community is busy at work too. I picture the utility bills in one large pile, the restoration bills in another, income deposits must also be tallied and countless other details I can only imagine. I would think writing the checks is probably the easiest part. Phew. My head spins just thinking of it. We really need to thank our treasurer.

# Building Rehabilitation Highlights: mid-June through mid-July 2016

On June 15, the meetinghouse was gently placed down on its new foundation by Geddes Building Movers! After about a month of being lifted off its old foundation, the meetinghouse now sits level and secure! The work during this phase included pouring a new foundation; building several piers under the building to support the main support columns that hold up the sanctuary floor; pouring a 3" reinforced slab under the whole meetinghouse and tower. This will provide a solid, dry, smooth surface in the space under the floor and will allow FPC to run electric lines, plumbing lines and heating pipes.

Skilled timber framing experts (staff of Preservation Timber Framing) are currently replacing rotted sections of sills with white oak beams sourced from New Hampshire. Millenium Granite of Maine has taken granite pieces removed from the old foundation and cut them into 2" slides that will be applied to the outside of the foundation (this will give it the appearance of the original granite foundation).

Morin Construction Services (MCS), our general contractor, has been filling in the cutouts in the foundation left from the steel lifting beams, insulating and waterproofing the foundation, and installing the perimeter drains. During this time period MCS has been working closely with members of the BAC to review the most recently-completed drawings for the new connector.

Right at the beginning of July, MCS suggested that some interior work within Noyes (reconfiguring the north end that is related to the upcoming connector) be completed in July — a wise adjustment of the schedule given the fact that some aspects of the connector design are currently being reviewed as this newsletter article is being written. The interior work within Noyes involves the rooms that had been the nursery and archives. These two spaces will be reconfigured and the end result will be that the nursery will swap locations with the archives. The upcoming new nursery will be on the east side of Noyes facing the parking lot. The upcoming new archives room will be on the west side and will be a windowless interior room. The room will be windowless because the design for the new connector wraps around that end of Noyes. (However, archival collections and historical artifacts aren't happy if they sit in the direct sun anyway!)

Harry Carter, Bill Wheeler, Pastor Heidi, Beth Nelson and Sue Weaver devised an efficient plan to set up a temporary nursery in part of A/B and then planned for and moved other items to a storage trailer (the second one that is now in the church parking lot). Janice Braley, Paul Lindemann, Sue Lindemann, Janet Wetherbee, Bart Wetherbee and Nancy Heywood moved many archival collection to the second storage trailer and also moved the most fragile items to an offsite climate-controlled storage unit.

The work on our complex church building that has been happening over the past 4-5 weeks should be celebrated and acknowledged: The professionals involved have done exemplary work and provided excellent communication with the BAC!! Also, many First Parish people helped in a timely fashion with good humor, despite the heat!

#### "PICK YOUR FAVORITE HYMN" MONTH

(For a mere \$23.99 per year, you too can own a guide to the secrets of hymn picking. But I should tell you, it's not as exciting as it sounds!)

However, in the month of August, we will be singing YOUR favorite in church because it's "Pick Your Favorite Hymn" Month. All it takes is for you write the name of your favorite hymn (and hymn number, if it's in the New Century Hymnal) on a piece of paper along with your name and contact information. Then, drop it into the Music Director's box in the office. Your hymn does not have to be in the NC Hymnal – we'll do our best to track it down and be in touch if we're having trouble finding it. When it's used, you have the option of having your name appear in the Bulletin next to the hymn name, indicating that it's your favorite hymn.

The expectation is to use all of the hymns submitted during the month of August, but if there is a heavy response to our "hymn challenge", the balance of selections will be used throughout the fall services. Submissions may begin immediately so we can organize the August hymn choices ASAP.


