From the Pastor's Desk Continued

Jesus was very specific about how to deal with conflict. In Matthew 18, Jesus explains that if someone sins against you that you must go directly to that person and to explain to them why you feel sinned against. In this first step, Jesus says that it is between the two of you. If the person listens to you, then you can be in right relationship once again. Now if the person does not listen to you, you must go to the next step. In this second step, you take with you one or two persons as witnesses to the offense against the one who sinned. If the one who is said to have sinned again refuses to listen, you then tell the whole church body. If the one who is believed to have sinned still does not listen, there will then be consequences.

Jesus is teaching us to talk our problems out and to listen to one another. Listening is not the same as agreeing. In the United Church of Christ we often say that we "agree to disagree." The main action is listening. As the poem says: our words will be windows or they will be walls. We choose.

Jesus had three steps for conflict resolution and a great article on "Dailygood.org" by Liz Kingsnorth notes 10 "tips for effective communication". Both systems have merit. I encourage you to read the whole article but here is a brief summary. In order to communicate effectively, you need to want connection. She says that the goal is respectful and compassionate quality of connection. Connection is more important and more nourishing than being right. Tips 2-5 are about the other person: listen to them, try to understand them, try to empathize with their experience. Then it's time to take responsibility for your own feelings. Sometimes another person's behavior triggers something inside us that is hurting. That person is not "at fault" – they are simply a lightning rod.

When we get to tips #7 and #8 it is time to be specific about what we need from the other person. We need to make requests that are practical, specific and positive and use accurate, neutral descriptions. Tip #9 is a big one: we need to be willing to hear 'no'. Something that would make you happy may not be the end result of this process – but if you are healthy enough to make it to tip 9, hopefully you are healthy enough to realize that for whatever reason you can't have your way but you have engaged in a healthy process. The 10th tip is about non-verbals. Be aware of how your body reflects your heart. Do you appear to be listening wholly – all the while your legs are crossed, your arms are crossed in front of you and when the other person speaks you are not making eye contact or perhaps even rolling your eyes. In other words, come wholly to the process of healthy and intentional communication.

May our words be windows rather than walls and may we grow in community, in relationship and in trust.



SONSHINE SOUP KITCHEN

We had a serving at the Soup Kitchen on August 22. We served 32 people with 4 take outs. The FPC crew worked to prepare chicken/grape salad sandwiches with a lettuce, cottage cheese, pineapple salad. A gardener from Londonderry brought in her yummy garden fresh tomatoes, red and yellow. We are still not using the dish washer so used all paper goods except for the preparation done in large metal bowls and of course cutting boards. Eileen Cox used the sprayers in the metal sinks to wash all of these and herself! Naturally the spray went in several directions!! The next one we host is in October and then we host December 26. SSK Team, Margie Ives, Sue Hunt, Eileen Cox, Paula Cox, Jennifer and Jaimie Cox and two helpers from Londonderry.

Building Rehabilitation Update

As we write this in mid-August, more progress has been made on the remaining work for the Meetinghouse foundation project. Preservation Timber Framing (PTF) is continuing to replace rotted sections of the sill with white oak beams. Millennium Granite of Maine has sliced and returned the granite pieces from the old foundation. These will cover the post-grading exposed concrete so that that our Meetinghouse retains the look of its historic foundation while resting on its solid new foundation.

PTF staff have also begun work on under-floor framing repairs and slight adjustments to ensure the floors of the Meetinghouse – both the MacGregor and the Sanctuary floors – are as level as possible.

Work on the accessibility connector has also started, but FPC faces challenges! As discussed in a special congregational meeting August 14th, for various reasons the cost of building the connector is more than our current budget covers. This means we will be completing just the *connector shell* this fall, and finishing it later when more funds are available (hopefully this spring).

The connector shell currently planned will be enclosed and weather-tight, but the contractor won't be installing siding or windows, or electrical wiring, or finishing the interior walls or floors. There will be passable stairs, but these won't have finished handrails or treads. We are hoping code enforcement officials will sanction occasional use of this structure for access into the Meetinghouse but this is not clear yet; our general contractor Dan Morin is investigating.

The connector shell's exterior will likely be graced by house wrap (e.g., Tyvek) for this fall and winter. Our budget shortfall has led the BAC to recommend eventually installing vinyl siding because of the very significant saving this affords in materials, installation labor, and long-term maintenance. If additional funds become available, wooden siding could potentially be installed this spring, or even as a replacement to the vinyl at any time. (Please talk with any member of the Building Advisory Committee if you are concerned about this, or any, issue.)

The current connector shell construction will also include the masonry elevator shaft, provisions for the elevator's large electrical requirements, and other aspects so that the elevator can be installed when we can finish paying for it.

Until then, accessibility to the Sanctuary level will be limited to the stairs (though the half-flight up from Noyes to the sanctuary via the new connector is better than the two fights up in the narthex, and we are looking at options like a temporary stair-chair lift along that half-flight). Given this situation, the Diaconate is considering whether the church should resume services in the Sanctuary this fall, or have services remain in Currier until Sanctuary accessibility can be achieved.

Meanwhile, the foundation for the accessibility connector has just been poured. The design for this evolved from early versions where the new elevator/staircase building stood directly behind the old connector to shifting most of that building southward into the yard behind Noyes. This results in a less-expensive, more fire-safe structure, and also means the short corridor we will walk along from the elevator (which will be behind Noyes) to the Sanctuary doorway can now be beautifully lit with windows on both sides.


