From the Pastor's Desk Continued

Pledging is the tool we use to guess what our income will be. **Pledging** is crucial to making informed decisions. And with 300 members, we receive fewer than 100 pledges. On a "level-funded" budget, i.e. no raises or additions to speak of in any one line item, we were "short" approximately \$13,000. With a budget that held raises for the staff, 5 extra hours for the CE Director, some minor increases to a couple of programs, we were "short" approximately \$30,000.

A member of the congregation stood up and said something along these lines: "There are 80 people in this room. If half of us – just half of the people here – could pledge \$16 a week (if you already pledged, that would be in addition to your first pledge), we would be able to fund the larger budget, the one with raises." She went on to boldly say, "I will do that. I will increase my pledge \$16 per week." I was so impressed and so taken by her act of courage and generosity – and the fact that this is New England and Yankees don't disclose financial decisions in public - that I was motivated to stand up and say, "I will to!" Another person said, "I'll raise my pledge \$25/wk." Another family said, "We will raise our pledge "\$20/wk." Someone said, "We will pledge \$64/wk." Someone else said, "I will pledge \$20/wk." And yet another person said, "\$20/wk." And yet another person said, "\$20/wk." It felt like the feeding of the 5000! It was exhilarating and amazing! I could hear the angels singing "Surely God is in this place!"

Feel free to check the math. That's 8 people (out of 80) and we raised enough for the "level-funded budget." Someone then made the motion that we add the 5 additional hours for CE, trusting that others would follow suit. And someone asked, "Should we have another congregational meeting soon and give other people in the room time to do some math at home and perhaps raise their pledge?" The Moderator indicated that that would not be necessary, that their pledge would always be gratefully received, and that the Council can act on behalf of the congregation between congregational meetings.

Numbers are not always easy for non-numbers people. One member got up during the meeting and expressed how confusing this budgeting process can be. I understand. Believe me, I do. What more can we do? I really appreciated the meeting earlier this month. Clearly it was not enough to raise the total level of understanding. Remember that Finance meetings are open. Council meetings are open. You are welcome to attend. If you can think of a way to provide a better understanding to more people please let your leadership know. I, myself, have a decent understanding of the ins and outs and would be happy to sit down with folks to assist people to better understand. If you can think of a better way of providing information, please let your leadership know. Help us to find a solution and provide a greater understanding to more people.

Thank you, one and all, for participating in the life of the church here at First Parish. We are the hands and feet of Christ. May we continue to work faithfully in service to God!

Board of Christian Outreach and Missions

<u>Family Promise</u>: The Board of Christian Outreach and Missions voted to replace Family Promise of Rockingham County, which ended last year, with Family Promise of Greater Nashua. Family Promise of Greater Nashua serves homeless families in the Nashua area, including Derry. It's a permanent facility, and can house up to 8 families at a time, relying on its small staff and many volunteers. In 2016, it provided temporary housing and meals to 57 people in 18 families. Families were in the program for about 9 months on average, and could attend classes provided on parenting, job search, and financial management. The program continues to provide guidance to the families after they leave the program, to help them remain independently housed. One year after leaving the program, 16 of the 18 families served were still in their own homes or apartments.

Zimbabwe Delegates: Delegates from Zimbabwe will be visiting New Hampshire from October 12th – 29th. The number of delegates is typically limited to around 12 and currently all delegates have a host Church. We have put our name on a waiting list in the event that a delegate cannot obtain a Visa, which sometimes happens, thus creating a vacancy. If you would like to participate in hosting a delegate or helping in transportation or other ways in the potential event we are called to do so, please speak to a member of Missions. We will also be talking with the Churches that are hosting delegates to see if we can assist them.

<u>Coffee Hour:</u> The Board of Christian Outreach and Missions will be hosting Coffee hour on February 11. We would be glad to talk to you if you would like more information about the Churches Missions work.



First Parish Congregational Church History

The oldest church in the immediate area, First Parish Church was founded by Scotch-Irish Presbyterians in the spring of 1719. Faith was and continues to be a priority. Worship was held one day after arrival, a church body was organized in one month and a building was built in 1722. A "more imposing structure" replaced the first in 1769, and although altered and expanded through time, the main building and sanctuary remain our center of worship.

First Parish Church became an independent community church in the Congregational tradition about 1810 as new settlers came to the area. Through the years the church has always had a strong instinct for both survival and faithfulness. In 1973 and again in 1985, we made major commitments to educational and community ministry through the additions of Noyes Hall and Currier Hall. We joined the United Church of Christ in 1995.
