From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Child of God,

Lent is a time to do some deep thinking and some honest praying. Those thoughts and prayers led me to a sermon and now to this newsletter article. I am more encouraged than ever before. I see God at work in amazing and wondrous ways! And I am oh, so grateful to be serving you here at First Parish.

On Sunday February 25th I preached a sermon entitled "Counting the Cost of Covenant". The sacred scriptures that are before us this Lenten season take us back to the Covenant that God made with Abram. To seal that covenant God required Abraham at the age of 99 to be circumcised, as well as all the males of his household! Our covenantal relationship with God comes with a cost: we are responsible and we are accountable. We are responsible to uphold one another in prayer. We are accountable to ask what more we can do to further the kingdom of God. And it may come at a cost.

When God told Abraham (who was then 99) that his wife Sarah was going to bear a child at the age of 90, Abraham fell on his face laughing. Imagine that! For me, this is really an important point. Sometimes God wants something for us. Sometimes God wants something that is hard for us to believe. It may even seem inconceivable. And God's normal is like a miracle for us! Sometimes the way is clear and sometimes there seem to be delays and detours, burdens and blocks. This doesn't mean that God wants it any less for us. It just means that perhaps there is something for us to gain by going *around* that we wouldn't understand by going *through*.

God made some pretty extravagant promises to Abraham. And although Abraham did not hide how he really felt, God was faithful to his promise and Abraham grew to be faithful to the relationship, as well.

From the Pastor's Desk Continued

When Jesus came along, he taught that it was more our behavior that mattered to God than any one ritual that we hold on to. In a relationship there is a give and take. In a sacred covenant there is a responsibility and an accountability. I am in covenant with you. I am responsible to give you my very best and I am accountable to you to acknowledge when I fall short. You are in covenant with me. You are responsible to talk to me, and you are accountable to ask me questions when you don't understand and to invite me into your life when you are troubled.

Together, we are in covenant with God. The Apostle Paul said it best in Philippians, chapter 4: "Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be known to God." Let me say that again: "Do not **worry** about anything, but in everything by **prayer** and supplication with **thanksgiving** let your requests **be known** to God."

The cost of the covenant that we have with God is not our flesh but it is our attitude and our faith practice. How much do we worry? And when we worry, do we blame and scapegoat? How much do we pray? How thankful are we? When we make our requests known before God, do we thank God in equal measure?

I have realized that I have broken covenant regarding the Meetinghouse. When the Friends of the Meetinghouse group was formed, I wanted to be part of it. I have from the beginning felt God's presence and seen God's blessing. I have known in my heart that we would be successful. But my participation in the secular organization defeated the whole idea of a separate and secular not-for-profit. I am many things but even when I take my collar off, I am not particularly secular. I see God at work everywhere and in this instance, I allowed culture to dictate my involvement and I separated myself. I have come to realize my misstep, because there **is** something that I can do. Just like there is something that you can do.

You see, many people are looking at the Friends organization with high expectations. Those high expectations are not being met fast enough and I have heard blaming and scapegoating. This is not ok. This behavior is not covenantal. This is not who we are. **We are a faith community with a firm foundation in worship and prayer and education.** We are not powerless. Far from it!

At the Annual meeting, Bill Mann explained how money was about relationship. The fact is that you know people that the members of the Friends of the Meetinghouse Board do not know. It is not good enough for you or I to write down a name and hand it to Beth or Bill. What must happen is for you to talk to your contact. **You** must tell them that you are involved in an amazing historic project that they need to hear about it because you wonder if they would want to be a part of history making history. **You** explain that there is someone who has all that facts and figures and can answer all the questions that they may have. **You** set up an appointment to go with a representative of the Friends Board to talk to the person that you know.

It is possible that you're thinking "well, that's their job." And, no, not really. Your responsibility in this is that you have the relationship and the Friends have the information. It's possible that you're thinking "I hate asking for money." Well, no one is asking you to. You are **introducing** a person you know to a person you trust who will ask for the money for a project that you believe in.

Let me say that again: you are introducing a person you know - to a person you trust - who will ask for financial support - for a project that you believe in. It's that simple.

And let us be thankful. We have done so much already. Let us give thanks for all the people who care, all the people who've worked so hard, all the people who have spent so much time on this project. Let us be thankful for our faithful ancestors. Let us be thankful for future generations who will enjoy the fruits of our labor. Let us thank God for all of the relationships that will be blessed in mysterious and divine ways. Let us thank God because God won't desert us now!




Looking for something refreshing this Spring? Why not delve into Rob Bell's Award-winning NOOMA Film Series with us?

Pastor Deborah often teaches us to stop, look, and listen for God everywhere and anywhere. Many of you know of my affection for rock 'n roll, and popular music in general and Bob Dylan in particular. One of Dylan's early and continuing influences was/is Buddy Holly. Holly and Norman Petty wrote a pretty well-known song called "Not Fade Away" that I heard one day as recorded by the Rolling Stones. If some of you don't know these names, they're pretty famous and you could google them. So the lyrics of this song are pretty simple and are typically interpreted as a teenage love song. And on this day as I listened, while doing the exercises prescribed for me in recovering from my injury last year, I thought what if God, or Jesus was speaking these words to me? The first verse is:

I'm a-gonna tell you how it's gonna be
 You're gonna give your love to me
 I wanna love you night and day
 You know my love a-not fade away
 A-well, you know my love a-not fade away

Think about that. Especially that "You know my love a-not fade away" line. Right? Then there's the second verse:

My love a-bigger than a Cadillac
 I try to show it and you drive a-me back
 Your love for me a-got to be real
 For you to know just how I feel
 A love for real not fade away

Can't you just imagine Jesus telling us "I try to show you my bigger than anything love and you don't even recognize it!" And still "A love for real not fade away" The final verse is:

I'm a-gonna tell you how it's gonna be
 You're gonna give your love to me
 A love to last a-more than one day
 A love that's love - not fade away
 A well, a-love that's love - not fade away

"A love to last a-more than one day". Yes!

So for a *few minutes* I thought about Jesus's love. Just a few. One of my other favorite performers is Van Morrison, a Northern Ireland native, Belfast, the port that Reverend MacGregor and his followers departed from back in 1718 headed for Boston and ultimately East Derry. One of Van's songs that I think of once in a while is "When Will I Ever Learn to Live in God" The chorus goes like this:

When will I ever learn to live in God?
 When will I ever learn?
 He gives me everything I need and more
 When will I ever learn?

I have failed way more often than I have succeeded in this love God, Jesus loves me, be a good Christian, be a good steward practice. It's hard. And we keep trying. This is what stewardship is about. This is what the stewardship board wants you to know. And we thank you for each and every thing you do to care for the church, the community, the creation. As Pastor Deborah often reminds us "You cannot do all the good that the world needs, but the world needs all the good that you can do.

Finally we want to thank Joyce Pope, a good steward indeed, for all her hard work on the stewardship board as she completes her term and moves on to other stewardship opportunities here at First Parish and elsewhere. Thank you, Joyce and blessed be.

BAC Rehabilitation Update

Have you noticed all the work that has been done on the tower base? You haven't? Oh yeah, you can't see most of it from the outside. Preservation Timber Framing (PTF) has been working hard inside the tower reconstructing the framing following the insertion of the 2 new sixty-foot-long corner posts. Doing this work properly requires a lot of hard work and time. This includes some new framing in the gable end wall and two portions of the end roof rafter.

The old bathroom that was in the tower has been completely removed and the lower portion of the stairs that led up into the tower has been removed. It is unclear when these stairs were built, but they blocked the original doorway on the west end of the tower. These lower stairs will be rebuilt on the north side of the tower to allow the future use of the original west doorway that will lead out to the west lawn area. We believe that this door was a major entrance into the lower level of the meetinghouse at one time. Another objective is to open up this lower level of the tower to MacGregor hall.

Another accomplishment with the tower interior redesign is the moving of the large organ blower from a small room at an intermediate level in the tower to the crawl space under the tower. This move provides more space around the blower for servicing and eliminates the small room that housed the blower. Eliminating this room provides a large open entry area leading to the west end tower door.

In accomplishing the tower work, there has been a meeting with PTF almost every week to review progress and address any questions. BAC has also had numerous meetings and communications with our contractors, Andover Organ, the state historian, Preservation Alliance director and amongst ourselves, to ensure that we are making the correct historical and economic decisions. A meeting with Morin Contracting Services, the company that built the new connector, reviewed the next steps toward completion of that project. With their assistance, we have prioritized the work and materials to be prepared to restart that work as funds become available.

The work on the tower base was delayed about 6 weeks back in September as we waited for the harvesting of the large white pine trees from a farm in Vermont that would become those sixty-foot-long corner posts. Therefore, the lower tower work has taken longer than originally planned, but should be completed in March. Work reconstructing the upper tower will begin this spring at PTF's workshop in Nottingham, NH. To complete that extensive rebuild will require additional funds. Our goal is to complete the upper rebuild by fall so that it can be reset on the tower base before December when our LCHIP grant deadline occurs.



**First Parish Congregational
Church History**

The oldest church in the immediate area, First Parish Church was founded by Scotch-Irish Presbyterians in the spring of 1719. Faith was and continues to be a priority. Worship was held one day after arrival, a church body was organized in one month and a building was built in 1722. A "more imposing structure" replaced the first in 1769, and although altered and expanded through time, the main building and sanctuary remain our center of worship.
