From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Child of God,

I prepared my monthly Pastor's Report for the May Council meeting on May 15, 2018. It was a poignant moment for me because it marked my 13th anniversary of ordination. As I reflected on what ordination has meant to me, I wondered how many of you understands everything that goes into the ordination process in the United Church of Christ. Allow me to briefly share with you the steps toward ordination. There are seven steps in the UCC.

1. "Feel a personal call by God." For me that happened when I was a child, but I ran and I ran – never feeling worthy of the vocation. That is, until that day when – like Jonah – I could not outrun God. One of the excuses I gave for judging myself unable to be a "good" minister is that I cry when people die. God did what God can so easily do: God turned what I thought was a curse into a blessing. I do shed tears when people lose their loved ones. This has been proven to be a blessing for many. After all, who created tears?

2. "Your community recognizes the potential you have for ordained ministry." My home church was Mt. Rise United Church of Christ in Fairport, NY, near Rochester. I was in seminary when I found them so they were used to the thought of me working in the church. And it was more than that. I worked with a committee with whom I shared many aspects of the journey toward service in the UCC. They saw a fit for sure.

3. "The wider church assists you in discerning your gifts and developing your skills for ordained ministry." This one looks like this: - a Master of Divinity program including studies in Bible, history of the Christian church, preaching, pastoral care, and UCC polity (governance);

From the Pastor's Desk

- Psychological testing, followed by counseling focused on my role as a pastor; - an ordination paper describing what I believe about God, Jesus, sin, grace, the church, and more; - Clinical Pastoral Education (We call it "CPE". For me, it meant a hospital chaplaincy position at Strong Memorial Hospital in Rochester, NY. The requirement was 400 clinical hours but God imagined that I would benefit from more. I ended up with an additional 1600 hours.); - Field Education (I served South Church, PCUSA in Rochester, NY. God's sense of humor, since I had experienced a difference of theological opinion with the PCUSA several years prior); - many other reflection papers, check-in meetings with advisors within the church and within the denomination.

4. "Local Church approves you for ordination." I worked with a committee, who monitored my progress and read all of my papers. They helped me to shore up my 30-some page Ordination paper into one that was half as long.

5. "Association approves you for ordination" This is called an Ecclesiastical Council. It is a "jury of your peers" in a way. Delegates in the Association, e.g. all Pastors and voting delegates from each church in the Association, receive your ordination paper ahead of time. A date is set and the council can last several hours. This is your opportunity to "defend" the contents of your paper. It gives members of the Association an opportunity to ask questions about your theology. During mine, a pastor was grilling me about "blood theology", as it's called. He was relentless about the sacrificial act of Jesus giving himself up for slaughter. Basically, he was trying to put words in my mouth – words that weren't my own, thoughts that were not mine. I finally said, "If I understand you correctly, we are going to have to agree to disagree on this point." The gathered body stood and cheered! I hadn't realized that this interrogation had gone on so long. They were tired of him abusing the time. Someone immediately called for a vote and I was approved unanimously.

6. "A local congregation recognizes your call to ordained ministry and calls you to be their pastor." After the Ecclesiastical Council my status became "approved pending Call." That is to say, that even though my local church approved my Call, and my peers approved my Call, I wasn't "recognized" by a local congregation. I did a search and the local congregation that called me was the Lakeville United Church of Christ.

7. "Celebrate with an ordination service!" The Association ordains a Called person and selecting a date has to coordinate several calendars: the church, the church's Moderator, the Moderator of the Association, the Chair of the Committee on Church and Ministry, AND the Conference Minister. That is a lot of calendars! The first date selected was a day in January and there was a blizzard!! (I still have that Ordination certificate – with the wrong date!) We had to reschedule to May 15. It took that long to get everyone there.

Things are changing in the UCC. Seminaries all over the country are reducing staff and some are closing. This is the domino effect of churches getting smaller. There are fewer and fewer full-time positions out there. All of this means that over time the standards will also change. We actually are seeing that in our own congregation. We have a member who is pursuing a lay minister's degree. She will not seek the M.Div. but rather is attending classes with the New York and the New Hampshire School of Ministry. These are on-line programs which suit people who must continue to work full-time while they seek a theological education.

With churches getting smaller, we need one another more than ever. You will hear more and more about First Parish doing activities with other churches, whether its youth programs, VCS, adult faith formation or mission. We are blessed to have a half dozen UCC churches within a 40-minute drive! Twice a year there are "Association Meetings". Everyone is welcome to attend those and find out what is happening in neighboring churches. Once a year there is the NH Annual Meeting in Concord. All are welcome! We have a vibrant Conference. I invite you to learn more about it. You can sign up for the weekly news from the Conference. You can get involved in some of the Conference wide programs.

When I first attended seminary, I did not know that the UCC existed. That can happen today, as well. Learn more about the UCC and pray that God lead you to have conversations with people who need meaning in their lives.

I thank God for leading me to the United Church of Christ all those years ago. I am grateful for the expressions of faith that I have witnessed and the faithful people that I have met. And I am proud to serve God and the people of this church through the United Church of Christ. There is so much more to learn and do! Let me know if you have any questions about anything I've written here. Let's spend some time together this summer and chat. I would look forward to that. I can usually schedule something within a couple of weeks. And if ever you have an emergency, I drop everything to come to you. You are in my daily prayers.

Next Facilities Meeting Tuesday 06/26/18

We've practically completed the **Tower Base Rehab Project**, including installing the new 60' tall corner posts and reconfiguring the first level to make the historic west-facing Tower door usable once again.

Next is **Steeple Restoration**, up at Preservation Timber Framing's shop in Nottingham NH. Work on the structure will likely begin in late June, with a start on the trim hopefully in August. The effort is extensive: much of the original material is decayed beyond use and must be reproduced following preservation guidelines. If this proceeds quickly, we may be able to bring the Steeple back and finish the whole Tower exterior in late Fall. (If not then, we may time this to the April 2019 Nutfield 300th kick off.)

As for the complex **Interior Refurbishments Project**, in June we plan to start working with experts Sutherland Conservation & Consulting to help us develop a plan addressing preservation, function, beauty, and safety. We will plan two paths in parallel, the minimum to begin using the Sanctuary again ASAP, and the full-scope preservation and lower-level rebuilding we want to eventually perform. Even the minimum work includes dealing with the failed lead ceiling paint and cracked asbestos flooring.

Once we have more information and preliminary plans, we can determine the best course of action on the interiors.

The **Roof System Rehab Project** must eventually be done, but with no significant roof leaking (and insufficient funds) it will be delayed another year or so.

The **Accessibility Connector Project** can't be delayed longer. We need this finished for even short-term use of the Sanctuary, and we need to at least complete the current building shell's exterior (doors, windows, siding) to weatherproof it before winter.

Project Costs and Fundraising

Projects have been delayed due to the challenges faced in our Phase 2 fundraising efforts, which have been mainly focused on the community. Here are the current priorities.

The **top priority** is raising the \$60K cash we need to match and receive the 2017 LCHIP award of \$30K for the Steeple Rehab. We need this by July to complete the Steeple work this summer/fall.

If we don't finish the Steeple and the entire Tower by the end of this December, we'll have to request a second extension from LCHIP for our 2015 Tower award (LCHIP grants normally must be completed two years from their December award notification; we've had one extension already.) Getting a second extension is likely because of LCHIP's overall investment and support of our project.

If we don't finish this year and fail to get the extension, we must return the Tower grant money we already received and spent — \$100K — and forfeit the remainder of the Tower grant (\$25K) and the Steeple grant (\$30K). This would require us to then raise the \$100K to pay back the state, and likely terminate our preservation work for some period of time.

The **second priority** is an additional \$30K necessary to cover various extra costs for the Tower Rehab Project, including refurbishing the historic door, and adding a new timber frame top plate. We need this by August/September in order to finish the Tower Rehab by the end of this calendar year.

The **third priority** is \$70K we need to resume the Elevator order and to get it installed. This is essential to enable reuse of the Sanctuary, since accessibility for all is a requirement. Receiving the elevator can take six months after we resume the order.

The **fourth priority**, completing the Accessibility Connector that holds the elevator, can have two phases. The first is to fully weatherproof the shell for \$30K, which needs to be done by winter to protect the structure. The second is completing the rest of the building – interior finishes, electrical & lighting, etc. – for about \$150K. (Material donations may make up some of these amounts.)

The **fifth priority** is to complete the least amount of work required to resume safe and functional (but not pretty) use of the Sanctuary. Until we get advice from the experts on the easiest remedies for the lead paint etc., we're guessing \$200K for this.

The rest of the fundraising goals include:

- Doing full preservation and rehab of the interior including building the new rooms in the lower level for a roughly estimated \$350K.
- Executing the Roof System Rehab project, for which we need \$118K in matching funds to receive the \$59K LCHIP award won in 2016. (Slipping completion past December this year will require an LCHIP extension, which could be a challenge depending on our other preservation progress.)
- Eventually raising an additional \$500K for ongoing stewardship.

Where We Are with Funding

As I write this, we have roughly \$35K in available Rehab Funds, and this amount is slowly growing every week with new donations. About \$1,500 from this fund will have to go to the Interior Refurbishments consultant. The rest is available to split among the projects already described.

We'll get another \$30K in LCHIP award cash and be able to complete the Steeple Restoration once we can prove we have that 2017 grant's \$60K cash match in hand. (Hence this \$60K being the top priority fundraising goal.)

Part of that \$60K match will come from a new grant we recently won. The Methuen Festival of Trees program has awarded us a 50% matching reimbursement grant for an \$8,800 Steeple trim sub-project (so that's \$4,400 cash towards the \$60K goal).

The NH Gives fundraiser the church is executing in June has a goal of \$8,000, which will go towards the extra \$30K needed for the Tower Project overruns.

There is also about \$40K remaining in the construction line of credit the church has with Enterprise Bank. We could use this for immediate rehab needs, but any additional amount drawn from the line of credit would raise current interest payments and increase the principal in the future conversion of this line of credit into a mortgage.

Conclusions

The rehab project work and the necessary fundraising are significant challenges, but no more intimidating than the entire project was when we started this effort in 2012. Our accomplishments so far vastly outweigh those of most historic preservation projects, and we have tremendous respect and support from the state-wide preservation community.

We need to proceed with confidence and faith – and also smart strategy, good management, and diligent effort – and continually refine plans to pursue the best path forward as situations evolve.

Restructuring Committee

The Restructuring Committee has met with 5 of the Boards over the last few months to receive their opinions to determine if there is a need to look at the structuring of our governance, boards, commissions and ad hoc works. The answers to that question were varied. We stressed that at the very least we hoped to make the work passion based, using volunteers in the talents they have to offer and not to have any one individual feeling overburdened.

Some Boards feel they are working effectively, that they have enough input and assistance. Others felt that they were struggling with membership and workloads. All were receptive to hearing about other churches and their successes and failures. No definite decisions were made either from those Boards or from the Restructuring Committee.

Our next step is to meet first with the Deacons on May 30th to bring some of the suggestions and comments back to them and to determine what changes are needed to assist them in their work for the church.

Please pray for us as we go through this journey together and please approach the members of this group with any suggestions or comments.



First Parish Congregational Church History

The oldest church in the

immediate area, First Parish Church was founded by Scotch-Irish Presbyterians in the spring of 1719. Faith was and continues to be a priority. Worship was held one day after arrival, a church body was organized in one month and a building was built in 1722. A "more imposing structure" replaced the first in 1769, and although altered and expanded through time, the main building and sanctuary remain our center of worship.
