

Health Access Sumbawa

On June 3rd Jack Kennedy (Karen Wilson's brother) gave a Mission Moment about the work he is doing in the remote islands of Indonesia. Jack lives in Bali part of the year and several years ago when visiting one of these islands contracted and almost died of Malaria. Jack presented his story of the work he is doing to support the health and well being of the islanders he has come to know. The organization is named Health Access Sumbawa.

Horton Center

We believe that Horton Center is a vital part of nurturing our Christian faith and as such fills an important role in our Churches Missions work. The Board of Christian Outreach and Missions has allocated funds to help our youth and their families defray the cost of attending camp. This year we helped sponsor Mikayla (only camper attending from our Church) through a contribution of 1/3 of the camp fee. The cost was shared equally with the Board of Christian Education and Mikayla's family. It should also be noted that the camper typically performs community service around the Church as a form of repayment. And if you are wondering, yes, Mikayla had an awesome time. Neighbors in Need (NIN)

The Neighbors in Need offering is a special mission offering of the United Church of Christ that supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. One-third of NIN funds support the Council for American Indian Ministry (CAIM). Two-thirds of this offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries (JWM) to support a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects through grants. Neighbors in Need grants are awarded to UCC churches and organizations doing justice work in their communities. These grants fund projects whose work ranges from direct service to community organizing and advocacy to address systemic injustice. This year, special consideration will be given to projects focusing on serving our immigrant neighbors and communities.

Beginning Sunday, September 16th, there will be collection envelopes in the Bulletin for those wishing to donate to this important cause. Most UCC congregations will receive the NIN offering on October 7, 2018 as part of their World Communion Sunday observance, however, some local churches select another date.

Where is the Pastor? - A Special Report from the Diaconate

A pastor's job is most often referred to as a calling. Like many professionals this job has standard expectations (minister and preach to the congregation on Sunday) as well as unplanned events (emergencies, funerals). The wording "calling" can lead us as lay people to hold our pastors to a higher expectation than our colleagues or ourselves.

How does the diaconate help our pastors preserve their strength and state of mind, as well as state of soul?

- Encourage our pastor to take her vacation and provide support to our church family when she is away
- Encourage our pastor to participate in continuing education or other learning opportunities
- Encourage our pastor to create a work schedule that allows her to have the time she needs to develop her sermon, time to support church boards and committees, regular office hours, and time at home. At the same time her schedule needs to be flexible for the unexpected calls for support.

How does this actually play out in real life?

Our Pastor Deborah's contract (the "job" part of her call) allows for 4 weeks of vacation and 2 weeks of study leave. So how does that affect you and me? How will we see this? The simplest way we will see this is that she will be missing from church for 6 Sundays. For those of us on Facebook we may see posts of smiling faces of her family and friends.

When Pastor Deborah is away the diaconate steps up to fill part of this void. On-call pastors or in-training pastors (called MID's) may also be hired to preach or provide pastoral care beyond that of the diaconate. When Pastor Deborah is away, the point of contact listed is often a current or former diaconate member that can be trusted to support you and help you contact the on-call pastor. Why the two-step calling path? (1) The initial contact numbers will change infrequently so it is easier to maintain. (2) This contact information may be widely disseminated so this helps protect the on call Pastor from calls from the wider public unnecessarily.

What does our pastor's work schedule look like?

Today, pastors are encouraged to think of their time in terms of block scheduling, called "units". At First Parish, the Personnel Board helps Pastor Deborah achieve this and keeps a copy of her log. A "unit" is a unit of time – 3 to 4 hours. Generally, mornings are considered one unit, afternoons are one unit and evenings are one unit. Because Sunday morning is so full, it is considered 2 units. Full time is 10 to 12 units. Other fixed blocks of time include specific boards and committees such as Council and Diaconate. These blocks often occur in the evening. This may mean that the pastor will not be in the office due to a non-working free block of time. Some scheduled blocks of time may be considered floating blocks — in this case if the pastor must attend to an unexpected event she may treat a floating block as off time to offset the time spent for an emergency.

Pastor Deborah's Sabbath is generally Monday. If you have a pastoral emergency, please call a Deacon who will contact her immediately.

What we have learned about working with Pastor Deborah is that she responds when she is called directly. She can't know what we don't tell her. She'll ask "would my presence bring you comfort?" Many people say that it's not needed. We have also learned that she responds to questions without hesitation. Talk to her. Ask her what you're curious about.

In closing, we hope that you will join the Diaconate in helping our pastor take care of herself so that she is available to us when we need her presence.

Board of Stewardship

During the past five years, the Stewardship Board has emphasized that stewardship is about more than finances. Which is not to say that financial stewardship isn't important and that you will not soon be hearing about our annual pledge drive - because financial support of the church is important and the annual pledge drive is a necessary tool in creating a budget and planning the operations of the church from year to year.

But financial stewardship is only one aspect of stewardship, a word which could embody the two great commandments, love God and love your neighbor. So basically everything we do, at church and elsewhere in our lives. One group of people have stepped up to perform an act of stewardship by studying the current operational structure of First Parish, i.e. boards, committees, etc., and offer some ideas on how to evolve that structure into something that might be more effective in the twenty-first century. And hopefully add some joy and take any drudgery out of doing the work of the church.

After having met with each of the major boards, the committee determined that the deacons would be the first board with whom to try an experiment. And the committee narrowed that down further to an area that the deacons have been struggling with, caregiving. Caregiving means visiting sick or injured parishioners, or sending cards, or offering meals, or providing transportation.

One of the main principles of any restructuring is thought to be changing the emphasis from monthly meetings and long term commitments to tasks or projects with clear beginning and end dates. And even if these projects were an ongoing need, the persons assigned to them would only be responsible for as long as they wanted to be, before they could step aside and let new volunteers step up.

All of these tasks will be discussed further with the diaconate during the coming weeks. It is intended that the deacons will retain responsibility for these tasks while delegating the activities to other volunteers. Will you be one of those to step up to offer your stewardship for one of these projects? Or maybe you can help Katie Cobban in her effort to update our safe church policy. There are always many opportunities here at First Parish to participate in various manifestations of your stewardship.

Welcome Home Sunday (formerly known as Rally Sunday) is coming soon and that will be a great time to explore the possibilities. Listen to the voice of the spirit and step up to stewardship! Thank you, and Blessed Be.



First Parish Congregational Church History

The oldest church in the immediate area, First Parish Church was founded by Scotch-Irish Presbyterians in the spring of 1719. Faith was and continues to be a priority. Worship was held one day after arrival, a church body was organized in one month and a building was built in 1722. A "more imposing structure" replaced the first in 1769, and although altered and expanded through time, the main building and sanctuary remain our center of worship.
