From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Child of God,

A long-time member wrote in last month's newsletter, "Our church will never be the same. We are grieving. We are broken. We have now heard from all sides, we have voted and decided we will support Pastor Deborah, so now is the time to come together."

There are many of you who have continued your participation in the life of the church, attending worship on Sunday morning. There are many of you who have not come to church since the vote. I want to be clear: the vote was about my employment, it was never about your membership status. As a church in the United Church of Christ, we acknowledge that we will not always agree on everything. I have said that and I believe that. I think and hope that you do, too. The hard part for all of us is accepting decisions that don't go our way.

The decision was made for me to remain pastor of First Parish Church. The vote did not mandate that if you signed the petition or if you voted for me to leave that you must now leave. Indeed, there are some who are so certain of my unsuitability for this church that they feel they cannot come back – but that is their choice not my desire. I have, from the first inkling of conflict, stated that reconciliation was my goal. This is still true. But reconciliation is not about me doing what you want or about you doing what I want. Reconciliation is about mutual care and understanding; it's about listening deeply to the wounds of the beloved Other. It's about figuring out how to move ahead together despite an unresolved disagreement, and committing to that path forward.

If you are one of the people that signed the petition for my employment to be terminated, or even if you voted for me to leave this place, please know that if you want to move forward with us, you are most welcome to come home! We hope you will. Let's move forward together. Let's work together on those things that we have talked about for five years. Let's improve the way we communicate.

From the Moderator of Council

Church Council typically meets the third Wednesday of the month. We receive input from the various Boards represented on the council. Pastor Deborah submits a monthly report as well. Minutes from our meetings will be made available on the church website and will show as a link from the newsletter. We welcome any parishioners to attend our meetings to provide their input on any subject matter we are discussing.

We have spent significant time lately reviewing the budget. It is a challenge to provide a balanced budget every year. The majority of our income comes from pledges by members of the church. We are trying to better communicate with the church members by holding informational meetings after church. The next meeting is scheduled for December 9th• We value your input, so please try to attend one of the meetings. The budget this year is increasing from last year due to two significant items. We have to start paying back the mortgage we took out to cover expenses of constructing the connector and repairing the sanctuary. The other major increase is money to cover a sabbatical for Pastor Deborah. These two items, along with the normal increases in expenses, increase our projected expenses by a significant amount of money.

We also have spent some time reviewing what changes we should make as a church to prevent another pastoral recall meeting. Rev. Richard Slater, the associate conference minister, met with us. He will be meeting with a task force of 10 members to develop a plan for the future.

We will also spend some time next year looking at the By-Laws of the church. If you have any interest in being a part of this committee, please let me or a council member know.

There are many positive things going on at the church. We have a lot of youth participation in weekly Sunday School, youth groups etc. Bible and book studies are very well attended. We have many projects to participate in at the Advent Workshop. Our Mission Board has been very active with Thanksgiving baskets and the Angel Tree. Your generosity to both these projects has been awesome.

Thanks for all that you do.

Councíl

Council Met on November 19. Here are some highlights from the meeting.

Our Clerk, Linda Webber, presented the minutes from the October meeting. A few points to keep in mind from last month:

- Even though pledge income is a little behind plan, 2018 budget should be OK by year end;
- For 2019 budget, 3% raise recommended for staff, but not for Pastor Deborah, and increase of hours for administrative assistant; Pastor Deborah's contract calls for her to take a sabbatical in 2019 and personnel recommends, for financial reasons, one month rather than the three months included in the contract; in August 2019, the meetinghouse construction loan converts to a mortgage and will require monthly payments; the last item being the biggest add to the budget; income goal including pledge and plate for 2019 is \$238,000;
- A meeting, open to all, was scheduled for October 28 to inform the congregation about the 2019 budget issues and answer questions;
- A lengthy discussion about the pastoral recall meeting resulted in the beginning of a plan for our church to move forward;
- Meetinghouse rehabilitation still moving forward, if slowly, plan in place for installing bricks around the flagpole;
- In her report, Pastor Deborah gave us this quote from Albert Einstein, We cannot solve our problems with the same thinking we used when we created them.", along with a list of things to think about doing as a congregation moving forward.

Our treasurer, Becky Fleury, presented the financial reports, and nothing much has changed from last month. Pledge income is still behind plan, somewhat to be expected given the recent effort by some to remove Pastor Deborah.

Last month's open meeting about the 2019 budget was not especially well attended with few questions. The question was raised of whether to do another one. Council decided yes, and a meeting is scheduled for December 9.

Paul Lindemann reported that good progress is being made on the meetinghouse tower.

Pastor Deborah presented a report that included updates on worship, wonder Wednesday, the music program, adult faith formation (connecting the current reading of the book of Acts to our church's modern issues), her study leave that focused on the history and use of labyrinths as a spiritual tool, an Advent challenge to council, and miracles, using Jack Leonard's recovery as an example.

At roundtable a discussion ensued regarding church bylaw changes to avoid the kind of unpleasant situation recently experienced in the effort by a group of church members to remove Pastor Deborah. Ultimately that effort was unsuccessful. The council discussion did not result in any definitive action. There is however a group now working with Richard Slater, our Associate Conference Minister, to help our entire congregation to move forward as a much healthier church. And I hope to very soon see a proposal from the Personnel Board with regard to church bylaws as they relate to a pastor's call agreement and the employee handbook.

All this just brings me back to my favorite singer/songwriter, Bob Dylan. In a song titled "Tangled Up In Blue", one of the final lines is "The only thing I knew how to do was to keep on keepin' on". Good advice I think. Just keep putting one foot in front of the other, listening for the voice of the Holy Spirit. And again in another song called "Pressing On", Dylan sings:

Shake the dust off of your feet, don't look back Nothing now can hold you down, nothing that you lack and the chorus:

> Well I'm pressing on Yes, I'm pressing on Well I'm pressing on To the higher calling of my Lord



Zimbabwe Container Update

The shipping container filled with supplies from New Hampshire Churches to our respective sister Churches in Zimbabwe was sent Sept 2017 made it to Beira via ship and to Mutare, Zimbabwe ZIMRA station via truck, last November on schedule. The "resignation" of President Mugabe, subsequent volleying for



power, concern about the contents of humanitarian containers "buying votes" in the poor rural areas, and general government ineptness has caused the container to sit there for 11 months. Paperwork has been submitted repeatedly and then "lost" and an "incentive" is sought to process new paperwork more quickly, etc. We recently heard that the container was offloaded into a storage unit in Mutare and we are hopeful that this means the shipment will soon be cleared.

Task Force- Moving Forward

THE TASK FORCE ON MOVING FORWARD

Our church is going through a difficult time. Some members feel alienated. Others feel disrespected or hurt. No one likes the tension that exists, and one thing everyone agrees on is that our church community is broken and needs mending.

A Task Force has formed to come up with a proposed approach for how we can all work toward greater harmony, and become the church we aspire to be. Some of the 9 members were invited by the head of council to join; others volunteered to be part of any effort to help heal the church and were added. The 9 members of the Task Force, in alphabetic order, are:

We held our first meeting on Thursday, Nov 15, with the Reverend Richard Slater, associate conference minister from the New Hampshire Conference of the UCC, as our facilitator. After an opening prayer and devotional (Romans 12: 3-18), we discussed the following topics:

- Review of our church's history of poor communication and conflict
- Discussion of "who is God calling us to become"—a loving community, united in a common God-inspired purpose
- What is the Task Force beng asked to do in the process of responding to God's call—
 develop guidelines for communication and showing respect for individuals' viewpoints and
 concerns; come up with concrete ideas for consideration by the church at large
- The need to incorporate the thinking of others outside the current Task Force on the best way to move forward.

The discussion touched on many issues, including the need for us all to be willing to compromise, to be willing to try approaches and ideas that might not be our own first choice, to not "draw lines in the sand." And the need for the Task Force itself to model this behavior.

One goal of this Task Force is to be as transparent as possible, and to get as much input as possible from the congregation. After each meeting, we will inform the council and the congregation about the topics that were discussed. We urge everyone to share their thoughts with us about how our church can become the church that God is calling us to be. You can do this by talking directly to any of the Task Force members, or by emailing any or all of us at the above addresses. As the process develops, there will be many opportunities for you to participate even more directly in building the cohesive community of faith that we seek to become.

The Moving Forward Task Force

Covenant

Covenant - what is it? And why it covenant important?

As members of the United Church of Christ we are a covenantal church. What does that mean? Covenantal behavior is an integral thread in the weave of belonging to the United Church of Christ. Some folks in our church will speak about the importance of being "congregational". Whereas this is true, it lacks an important perspective that is a key identifier of the United Church of Christ, our denomination.

The Installation of a Pastor "is the liturgical celebration of the covenantal relationship among the ordained minister, the local church, the Association, and the calling body if different from the local church. Upon request from the local church and the ordained ministerial partner, the Association participates in planning the installation service in cooperation with the other partners in the covenantal relationship." (From the Manual on Ministry "Perspectives and procedures for Ecclesiastical authorization of ministry" page 7)

"We are a church shaped by Covenant. Covenants differ from contracts. A Covenant does not dissolve automatically at the point that the parties disagree or experience discomfort, or when change occurs....that dynamic tension between autonomy and covenant are at the heart of what it means to be the United Church of Christ. Therefore Covenant means that each setting of the Church agrees to be held accountable by the others, and each agrees to allow its individual identity to be shaped in part, by its relationship to the other settings of the United Church of Christ....All member churches and individual members of the UCC denomination need to understand that local autonomy "in a covenantal polity is neither absolute or self-generated", but carries with it accountability to others in the covenant." (From the UCC Manual on Church Volume 1, Draft 2, October 2006)

As a church body we are covenantal, as well as congregational, as well as Christian, as well as evangelical, as well as reformed. The sheer historical reality of our important four forebears demands that we come together more than legally through a contract which is based on law and oftentimes built on fear. We have - and must - come together through covenant which is based upon God's grace and built of God-given love and trust.

Those who did the hard work of establishing the UCC as a denomination included the biblical and foundational work of covenant building. Our relationship with God is covenantal. A pastor covenants with the local church and affirms a "call" not a "contract". The local church covenants with the Association. Churches and Associations covenant with their partners in ministry. Our identity as members of the UCC is rooted in being people of the covenant: a promise and agreement, holding fast to the Presence of God, as an intimate partner in the relationship.

Covenantal relationships are sacred because God is a full participant in the promise. As we grow in love and faith, let us seek to also grow in our understanding of what it means to be a covenantal church.

The four benches which will be inscribed according to the direction of the buyers will be ready for installation on or about April 2, 2019.



First Parish Congregational Church History
