From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Child of God,

leader Marianne Williamson says it this way: "Love is what we are born with. Fear is what we learn. The spiritual journey is the unlearning of fear and prejudices and the acceptance of love back in our hearts. Love is the essential reality and our purpose on earth. To be consciously aware of it, to experience love in ourselves and others, is the meaning of life. Meaning does not lie in things. Meaning lies in us."



Angel Tree:

Each year at Christmas time, Missions sponsors the Angel Tree program which assists families in need in providing a little more Christmas joy for their children. We have also provided gifts to shut-ins to brighten their Christmas. This year your generosity provided 123 gifts to 25 families which included 34 children and 29 adults.

Christmas Fund:

Thank you to all who contributed to this special offering. If you would still like to donate, please see a member of the Missions board. The Christmas Fund Offering (formerly the Christmas Fund for the Veterans of the Cross), one of five Special Mission Offerings of the United Church of Christ (UCC), is an important way of sharing our joy at God's renewing and life-giving grace. The Offering, which is administered by the United Church Board for Ministerial Assistance of the Pension Boards on behalf of the UCC, is an expression of joy and gratitude to, and for, those who serve the church. Gifts to the Christmas Fund help provide pension and health premium supplementation to low-income retirees, emergency assistance to the families of clergy and lay employees and Christmas Gift Checks to hundreds of annuitants.

Derry Friendship Center:

On Sunday, January 20th a Mission Moment will be given highlighting the contributions of the Derry Friendship Center to our community which we support through your Missions giving. The Derry Friendship Center is a non-profit community organization that provides a safe and supportive environment for twelve-step recovery regardless of race, creed, color, gender or ethnic origin. For over 30 years, The Derry Friendship Center, Inc. has provided a safe, confidential, alcohol and drug free environment for people seeking and/or maintaining recovery from substance abuse and to participate in activities and ongoing rehabilitative peer support to people in recovery from alcoholism and drug abuse.

Zimbabwe Container Update:

The shipping container filled with supplies from New Hampshire Churches to our respective sister Churches in Zimbabwe, which was sent Sept 2017, made it to Beira via ship and to Mutare, Zimbabwe ZIMRA station via truck, last November on schedule. After months of careful negotiation with ZIMRA, a portion of the goods from the container are ready to be liberated. The contents of the container have been off-loaded into a storage warehouse in Mutare.



It is a long complicated scenario, and it involves ridiculous fees on boxes of shoes and clothes (assessment of \$5 per kg (\$2.72 per pound)), of which there are hundreds among the 1200+ boxes/items loaded onto the container. The plan is to prioritize medical supplies, tools, school supplies, etc. and liberate as much of the shoes and clothes as available funds allow. The Missions board has donated \$100 towards helping to liberate supplies from the container so that the supplies can make it to our sister church in Mutare.

<u>Food Basket Program:</u> The Food Basket program is a vital part of our Missions work as a Church of Christ. The food basket is kept outside of Currier Hall. The food from the food basket alternates between the Derry Food Pantry and the Upper Room, both important programs supported by your missions giving. If you have donated canned goods or other food items to this program in the past, thank you. If not, please consider dropping off items in the food basket on Sunday, or anytime the Church is open. Donations are desperately needed and always appreciated.

BAC Rehabilitation

If you have been anywhere near the church you have noticed that there is lots of activity around the tower. There are two areas of staging (inner and outer) around the tower, wood framing and lumber on the ground and the belfry tower frame erected within the staging. The materials for rebuilding the belfry and lantern have been moved back to FPC from Preservation Timber Framing's (PTF) workshop in Nottingham, NH.

For the last several months PTF has been busy reproducing the materials needed to reconstruct the belfry and lantern, the steeple portion of the tower. Most of the wood in the original structure was unusable and had to be duplicated from new timber. That work is now done and all those materials are back on site. On December 12, a crane was on site to erect the belfry frame within the inner staging frame. The framework of the lower lantern was placed upon its base frame within the outer section of the staging. The upper lantern, completely covered in protective copper, was subsequently placed upon the outer scaffold awaiting placement on top of the lower lantern once it has been encased in its wood sheathing.

Work will continue throughout January to complete the steeple components. The staging will be wrapped in tarps to protect the work area from the wind and weather. PTF has set up a workshop within MacGregor to work on the various siding and finish components for the belfry and lantern. When the belfry and lantern components are nearly complete, another crane day will be scheduled around mid-January to raise the upper and lower lantern pieces and place them on top of the belfry. In March, when the weather warms (hopefully), all parts will have finish painting performed and be ready for unveiling for the Founders Day 300th celebration on April 14. Following that weekend, a very large crane will be on site to place the finished steeple back to its majestic place on top of the tower to again watch over the Nutfield area.

BAC members continue to meet with PTF owner Arron Sturgis regularly to monitor the work schedule and costs. In addition, PTF provides a detailed weekly summary of work progress.

BAC would like to have one or two more members join our committee to help manage all the rehab work planned. If you have any interest in participating in this extraordinary historic rehabilitation work, please talk with any one of us on the committee.



The oldest church in the immediate area, First Parish Church was founded by Scotch-Irish Presbyterians in the spring of 1719. Faith was and continues to be a priority. Worship was held one day after arrival, a church body was organized in one month and a building was built in 1722. A "more imposing structure" replaced the first in 1769, and although altered and expanded through time, the main building and sanctuary remain our center of worship.
