From the Pastor's Desk-

Dear Child of God,

We are 300 years old! I have been working toward and waiting for the moment to say this for several years! I think it merits repeating, don't you? We had an amazing Founders Day Weekend. There was so much excitement and activity in and around the church. It was a joy to meet descendants of Pastor MacGregor and of the sixteen families. It was an honor to host two amazing worship services: one with former pastors and one with ecumenical partners in the area! And with all the publicity that we attained – and truly, it was well-done – I've talked to so many people who didn't know about it! Half of those people said, "You should do it again!" My initial reaction was, "how would we do it again?" How do you have a second birthday party? But you know after 300 years, why not? I don't know how and I don't know when but what do you think? Shall we have another party in the next six months and get more townspeople up to our hill?

In the midst of all of the 300 preparations, I wrote a grant for my 2020 Sabbatical. I had a lot of help from church members. There were a total of 8 draft copies; rewrites; tweaking; consolidating. We ended up with an amazing proposal that I pray will be impressive to the folks who give out these grants. Just to recap, in case you missed that piece of news, my plan is to look at three different Christian settings and specifically their singing together and then to bring some of those songs back to First Parish. The three settings are: Celtic spirituality, African American Christian, and contemporary praise. The grant was for \$49,000 and covered the expenses of traveling, not just for me but also for Liz, my spouse and for the resident artist, who travels with me and then comes back and shares with all of you in church and after church what we've learned that month. The grant will also pay for the supply preacher who will come in my absence and who will be available for pastoral

emergencies. Pray with me that the grant be accepted.

AND in the midst of all of that, I prepare for my May study leave to New Mexico. Last year I began my training to become a Labyrinth Facilitator. I went to Prescott, Arizona for the first training. Letter from Alice M.C. Ling

My dear friends,

How I wish I could be with you as you gather to celebrate the first 300 years of Nutfield and what we know now as First Parish Church. You cannot begin to know how grateful I am for our years together, and how fervently I pray for you this weekend as you celebrate the milestone before you.

When Pastor Deborah invited me to share a memory or two, I faced an avalanche of memories: Horton Center weekends and Best Breakfasts, Bible Study in the nursery and Mission Trips to New Orleans, Women's Retreats and Vacation Church Schools, ministry with Lucy and the everyday give and take, conversational work of being in community and living as the Church of Jesus Christ.

Before I had a chance to get too carried away with all of those memories or even pretended to take on the impossible task of choosing one, I remembered that the invitation I received related to the history of the church. Again, there are many, but I think one of the aspects of First Parish that has always struck me as most important is the fact that the initial settlers, before they did anything else, gathered for worship and founded a church. There's nothing like a 1700's ocean crossing to help a community know their need of God, and to focus their priorities for life in their new land. And so, before they organized a town or erected buildings, they met for worship: to gather themselves as the



Pinkerton Homeless

Let me tell you a little bit about our homeless/needy program at Pinkerton. A friend and I started this about 20 years ago when we had one homeless student attending High School here. We thought it would be nice to provide that family with an unexpected Christmas. We personally bought gifts for the entire family that year. Before we knew it the numbers of homeless were more than we could handle. We began asking the faculty for help and we were able to cover the needs for a while. Now we are helping anywhere from 60-100 folks a year. We depend on the outside community now to pitch in where ever they can. We provide school supplies, new clothing, lunches, Christmas and sometime Thanksgiving when we have the funds. Your donations go toward all these things. It is nothing for us to spend \$800 or more on just one family sometimes.

A little example for you. We recently bought school clothes, shoes, book bags filled with supplies, food cards, etc. for a family of 6 living in a tent. I can't tell you how bad I felt as I looked out the window as the rain was pouring down thinking about that family in a soggy tent in a muddy campground packed with their belongings and children from 2 years old to 14 years old. When I called the mom to say our shopping was complete, I could hear the 2 and 4-year-old crying in the background. Mom borrowed a car and was here in a flash and so grateful she was crying. I could not help but notice that they were all dirty and anything but odor free and wearing the same clothing they were in when I met them days ago. The smiles were infectious and this is why we do what we do. The high school boy and 5th grader can now go to school in nice new clothing with new book bags and no one will guess they are living in a tent.

Most years we need about \$10-\$12,000 to support our program needs. Most of the funds are raised here and some are from our community churches. We are happy to receive any amount that we can and are thankful for your continued support.

Moving Forward Task Force

UPDATE AND INVITATION FROM THE TASK FORCE FOR MOVING FORWARD

The Task Force has been hard at work and will hold congregational discussions over the next 6 weeks to describe what has come out of that process. We ask that all members attend one of the 3 sessions, each of which will have the same agenda and format. The discussions, which will be held on Sunday, May 19 and Sunday June 9 immediately after church, and on Sunday evening June 2 at 6:30 pm, will be 90 minutes. We'll introduce the covenant that we have drafted (see below), describe the goals, do a quick role play to show what a difference living by the covenant can make, break into small groups of 8-10 people to discuss reactions to the covenant and then get back together to pool our thoughts and address questions. Each breakout session will be facilitated by a member of the Task Force. Please sign up in Currier on May 5 or May 12 for the session that works best for you, so we can have a head count.

WHAT IS A COVENANT, AND WHY DO WE NEED ONE?

We are a church family. Like any family, we sometimes have difficulty communicating without hurting each other's feelings. A covenant is an agreement—a mutual promise made by all those who sign on to the covenant. It is through a covenant that God binds himself to his people in a relationship of fidelity and care. God pledges fidelity to his people Israel, both the historic Israel of the Old Testament and the renewed Israel of the New Testament (Ephesians 2:11-22). This binding to his people is a solemn one and God remains faithful even when his people are not. We acknowledge this covenant each time we take Communion "this cup that is poured out for you is the new covenant in my blood (Luke 22:20)." The Task Force on Moving Forward and the Council of First Parish Church believe that our church needs a Covenant that describes how we agree to treat each other.

The goal of adopting a Covenant is not to stifle disagreement, which is healthy and inevitable. Rather, the goal is to promise each other that we will have these disagreements in ways that are respectful and constructive. The Task Force has drafted a Covenant, based on extensive reading, reflection, prayer, and discussion. Every suggestion in the draft Covenant below is based on God's word--on how God expects us to act. They are not "rules" that we are required to obey, but rather commitments that we willingly make to each other to help us live the Golden Rule. Members of the Covenant commit to holding themselves and each other accountable to the Covenant, by gently telling the person who has hurt us about the pain we are feeling and forgiving them, and asking for forgiveness when we hurt others. The Task Force and the Council of FPC seek to have the Congregation review, clarify, embrace, and adopt this Covenant.

Adhering to a Covenant is not easy. Even within the Task Force, we have repeatedly failed to abide by the Covenant, despite our best intentions. But ultimately, we have found that it works, and that our interactions are more respectful, more productive, healthier, and less stressful. It feels better. We feel like we are doing a better job of living up to the Golden Rule.

A church family is built when people make promises to one another, hold each other accountable, and sacrifice together in interactions toward a common end. That is the goal of adopting a Covenant at FPC.

DRAFT COVENANT (4/26/19)

Behave like Christ expects us to

- 1. Pray for one another.
- 2. Forgive one another, and ask for forgiveness when you have hurt others.
- 3. Seek what is best for the church as a whole, not what is best for an individual or group.
- 4. Find time for humor and fun, even in the midst of struggles.
- 5. Make positive investments in others' lives (through support, ministry of care, inquiring about their well-being, etc.).

Keep an open mind

- 1. Recognize that conflict and differences are a normal part of life.
- 2. Acknowledge and respect others' views/opinions.
- 3. Believe the best about others' words and actions; assume positive intent.
- 4. Actively participate in and support the decisions of the group.

Communicate clearly and listen carefully

- 1. Do more listening than talking, practice "active listening", with genuine desire to understand.
- 2. Speak only for yourself, using "I" statements.
- 3. Focus on issues not people, interests not positions.
- 4. Ask questions for clarification instead of assuming or making judgments.
- 5. If you have a disagreement with someone, talk to them directly.

When you go through medical issues and the highlight of your week is going to the doctor there is also nothing like receiving a phone call or a visit to see how you are doing.

Song Weavers

For close to 25 years the SongWeavers got together from September to April just to sing together. They then had one concert. When I joined five years ago I encouraged the conductor to do a "pre-concert" concert at First Parish. The women loved the idea. The Songweavers concert in April 2016 was the last thing that happened in our sanctuary in the Meetinghouse before the rehabilitation project began. The following year, the SongWeavers sang in our Currier hall. Last year the pre-concert concert was in a church on the west side of the river in Manchester and this year it was at the First Congregational Church in Manchester. (The same day as our Founders Day!)

We never get sheet music. Peggo sings our parts to us and we listen, we sing it back to her. We learn by singing. It is powerful. Lyrics of songs can be especially moving and very powerful. This year the theme was "I Am Light", which is a song by Indie. Arie. Here are some of the words to that song: "I am light. I am light. I'm not the things my family did. I'm not the voices in my head. I'm not the mistakes that I have made or any of the things that caused me pain. I am not the pieces of the dream I left behind. I'm not the color of my eyes. I'm not the skin on the outside. I am not my age. I am not my race. My soul inside is all light. I am light."

The whole program was full of songs that spoke of the power and dignity of the human spirit. We sang tribute to our ancestors who taught us goodness and kindness and integrity. We heralded the strength of women who persevered and yes, persisted. "I come from women who gave up their power; I come from women who gave up their name; I come from women who rocked their babies; I come from women who know nothing ever stays the same; I come from women who vow to do better; I come from women who know no one ever walks alone, fights alone."

There are SongWeaver Drummers who always do an amazing job and there is often a guest group who sings a song. This year the Concord Community Music School's Women's Ensemble sang a song entitled: "Kinder" by Copper Wimmin. (Please forgive the punctuation and capitalization: it is not correct, nor is it original. In the song, there is no punctuation at all. I wanted to get it all into one paragraph so I took complete license. I left the capitals so that you might see what each phrase starts with.) "I've decided to be happy; I've decided to be glad; I've decided to be grateful; For all I ever had. I've decided to let go; Of all this pain tonight; I've decided to let go; Of all these demons inside. I know I am blessed; I know All I ever wanted was this. I know I don't need more; I've got What I came for. I've decided to be open; To that little voice inside; Telling me I'm beautiful; It's ok to be alive. I've decided to be kinder; To myself when I feel sad; I've decided to be grateful; For all I ever had; I know; I am blessed; I know; All I ever wanted was this. I know; I don't need more; I've got What I came for"

Music is powerful and song lyrics offer consolation and courage or strength and power. May you be blessed by reading them. In hope, Pastor Deborah



First Parish Congregational Church History

The oldest church in the immediate area, First Parish Church was founded by Scotch-Irish Presbyterians in the spring of 1719. Faith was and continues to be a priority. Worship was held one day after arrival, a church body was organized in one month and a building was built in 1722. A "more imposing structure" replaced the first in 1769, and although altered and expanded through time, the main building and sanctuary remain our center of worship.
