We **are** dedicated and we **have** persevered these last few years. As I write this article, the crane is here and the scaffolding is coming down.
When you read this article, the steeple will once again be where it first began centuries ago – renewed and ready for another couple of centuries.

"Renewed" and "ready": to what end? What is our purpose here at First Parish? Our mission statement is clear: we are a faith community who values worship, pray, education and service to others. Our actions demonstrate that we are a faith community who cares deeply for the surrounding community, who cares deeply for our children and youth, and who cares deeply for one another because we know that God cares deeply for us.

Although our attention is drawn into the wood and pegs and rehabilitation of an historic building, we are simultaneously guided by a loving God who encourages us to feed the hungry and welcome the stranger. In other words, we are doing both in-reach AND outreach. While we pray for and spread the word about the much-needed funds to finish the rehabilitation project, our members continue to serve the hungry at the soup kitchen and at our own spaghetti supper, among other mission-oriented tasks.

What is our "fuel" for the work that we do? Where do we find the motivation for both in-reach and outreach? As Christians, we look to the

sacred scriptures. The New Testament tells us about Jesus' life: what he said and what he did. The Old Testament is important to us, because it was important to Him! He quoted those books and those stories often! We find strength and reminders in the stories that are then woven into the fabric of our faith.

I recently saw a list of "50 stories that young people should know" - *before* they begin Confirmation. As I looked at that list of stories, as I listen to people talking about church, as I read articles about churches that are growing – and churches that are not! - I am struck by the critical importance of those "stories". We are a faith-based people who rely on the sacred stories of our forebears –especially Jesus! Another word for 'story' is narrative. I remember when the Stewardship Board explained our financial scenery using a "narrative budget".

So, what *are* our faith stories? Not just snippets of stories or scriptures taken out of context. What is the story of Ruth? Of Esther? Of Josiah? Of Jeremiah?

After several conversations with numerous lay leaders, it was decided that our Sunday morning worship is going to feature more regularly the stories of our faith tradition. Up until now, we have followed the Revised Common Lectionary (RCL). This summer, I will meet with a group of interested folks and together we will plan the schedule for the year and develop a "narrative lectionary". This information will be available in the same way that the RCL is now available. If you would be interested in helping us devise our schedule – OR if you have a favorite story and you want to make sure that we include it, please don't hesitate to let me know!

Our faith is strong and our steeple is back home. Thanks be to God! Pastor Deborah

Letter from Council

As we come to the end of the month of June, I'm thinking about change. The season changes, sometimes dramatically, from spring to summer. We celebrate the season of Pentecost, the birth of the Church, the change that that represented for humankind. There are weddings. There are graduations. All represent big changes for the individuals involved. I am personally about to embark on a huge change with a move from New Hampshire to Florida. Among the things I will miss are the many warm relationships I have developed here at First Parish. And the influence Pastor Deborah has had on my personal faith journey.

Sounds to me like he has faith in God and the Holy Spirit to bring about the change that his community is longing for. Might we also find that kind of faith right here in our church community?

And of course Bob Dylan has written about change. First from the "The Times They Are A-Changin":

The line it is drawn

The curse it is cast

The slow one now

Will later be fast

As the present now

Will later be past

The order is

Rapidly fadin'

And the first one now

Will later be last

For the times they are a-changin'

So the last will be first, and the first will be last.

Generosity. We have just recently celebrated Father's Day. My own father was one of the most generous people I have ever known. May we all aspire to such generosity, and embrace the changes that have been occurring and continue to occur here at First Parish and in our personal lives.

And again Bob Dylan, in one of my all time favorite lines from a song called "Things Have Changed":

Lot of water under the bridge, lot of other stuff too Don't get up gentlemen, I'm only passing through

First Parish has been through some stuff, as have we all, and undoubtedly there will be more stuff before our lives are finished. And for those who follow us in generations to come. Change is inevitable. May we find joy in the promise of a bright future while acknowledging the sadness at the passing of times past. They are all blessings.

And one final quote from a Joan Baez song titled "Carry It On", also from the civil rights era:

When you can't go on any longer, Take the hand, hand of your brother, Every victory brings another, Carry it on, carry it on.

Letter from Finance

On June 9 the congregation was invited to take part in a conversation about the Building Rehabilitation Project work. The goal of the conversation was to let us know what has been done, what is left to do, and what it will take to complete the rest of the project.

Following is the financial information provided for that conversation. It provides a summary of the money raised for the Building Rehab project, how the money was used, mortgage details, how the mortgage affects the general budget, and a general budget update.

We would like to note that Pledge & Plate income are running behind anticipated budget levels. If you're wondering where you stand in terms of your pledge commitment, mid-year giving summaries will be sent out in early July. We encourage you to review your statement. If your situation has changed and you believe you won't be able to keep your pledge commitment, please be in touch with Pat Crowell.

Building Loan → Mortgage

- Total Amount Borrowed = \$500,000

How the Mortgage Affects the Budget

- 2019 budget included \$10,250 for mortgage payments, based on a lower loan balance
- Will add \$1,587 to budget expenses in 2019
- Total Annual Mortgage Payments = \$28,409 at current 4% interest rate

2019 Budget Update

- 2019 budget approved with a \$3,820 deficit
- Current deficit is over \$9,000
 - Income Pledge & Plate both running behind
 - Expenses On target



First Parish Congregational Church History

The oldest church in the immediate area, First Parish Church was founded by Scotch-Irish Presbyterians in the spring of 1719. Faith was and continues to be a priority. Worship was held one day after arrival, a church body was organized in one month and a building was built in 1722. A "more imposing structure" replaced the first in 1769, and although altered and expanded through time, the main building and sanctuary remain our center of worship.
