From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Child of God,

Every single one of us is being "put to the test". We are being bombarded by the adverse effects of disease, climate, and societal issues like politics, education and racism. And it doesn't matter if we find ourselves on the front lines or at the back of the bus – we feel the stress, we feel the toxic energy and we yearn for light, for lightness and for healing.

Healing comes in many forms. Over the last few months I have been offering zoom-based Labyrinth finger walks weekly. These have offered sacred pauses for many – and for me. Most recently I have come to appreciate the beauty and divine wisdom found in poetry and I've also noticed certain words that have grace, beauty and divinity all at once. One such example of profound meaning and sacred power is in the words "kind" and "kindness". Allow me to share a poem entitled: Small Kindnesses by Danusha Lameris:

I've been thinking about the way, when you walk down a crowded aisle, people pull in their legs to let you by.

Or how strangers still say "bless you" when someone sneezes, a leftover from the Bubonic plague.

"Don't die," we are saying.

And sometimes, when you spill lemons from your grocery bag, someone else will help you pick them up. Mostly, we don't want to harm each other.

We want to be handed our cup of coffee hot, and to say thank you to the person handing it. To smile at them and for them to smile back. For the waitress to call us honey when she sets down the bowl of clam chowder, and for the driver in the red pick-up truck to let us pass.

We have so little of each other, now. So far from tribe and fire. Only these brief moments of exchange.

What if they are the true dwelling of the holy, these fleeting temples we make together when we say, "Here have my seat," "Go ahead----you first," "I like your hat."

Small kindnesses are life-giving: the poet calls them "fleeting temples". Maya Angelou talked about the fact that people won't remember what you said, but they will remember how you made them feel.

As Christians living in these tremendously difficult times, how do we steel ourselves so that we might show kindness to one another. The prophet Micah suggested that this was in fact one of the three things that God requires of us: "to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?"

Loving kindness doesn't just mean to notice other people's kindness. It doesn't mean to appreciate when people are kind to us. Love is ALWAYS a two-way street. So loving kindness happens when we are kind, when we do act of kindness or like the poem says, when it is us that says "Go ahead – you first."

Richard Rohr recently wrote: "We cannot abide in (a place of negativity) for any length of time or it will become our prison. God cannot abide with us in a place of fear. God cannot abide with us in a place of ill will or hatred. God cannot abide with us inside a nonstop volley of claim and counterclaim. God cannot abide with us in an endless flow of online punditry and analysis. God cannot speak inside of so much angry noise and conscious deceit. God cannot be born except in a womb of Love. So, offer God that womb."

Oh, my goodness, isn't that poetic? "God cannot be born except in a womb of Love. So, offer God that womb." We MUST offer God a womb of love; love that begets kindness; love that remains patient and kind. In the days and weeks ahead, be sure to develop your kindness muscle and remember that it could simply consist of a smile and saying, "I like your hat."

Angel Tree will also be a challenge this year, but we pray that somehow, we can make this happen.





Greetings everyone!

We continue to offer Sunday worship services virtually through Zoom and Facebook. We would like to remind people that these services are recorded, which means two things. 1: You can come back anytime and watch it, if you are busy Sunday morning. And 2: When you lift up prayer concerns you may not want to use full names. When we speak the name in the safety of our sanctuary, it is different. Saying a name on our recorded services puts a name into the ethos forever.

Pastor Deborah has offered outdoor services several times. When the grass was wet we moved to the parking lot near the church which worked very well. There will be one more Wednesday evening vespers service on October 7th at 6pm and one more Sunday morning outdoor service on October 11 at 8:30 am. If it's actively raining, we won't have the service but if it is "only" wet or cold, dress appropriately.

We have formed a task force to call people and check in. We want to make sure that you are OK, ask if you have any prayer requests and make sure that you can access the worship services. We look forward to having a conversation with you.

We are so grateful to God for our church, for the space, for the buildings, and especially for the Meetinghouse. Much attention and work has been faithfully accomplished. There is more to do. We launched a program combining gratitude, walking, praying and circling. So we are going to walk prayerfully around the Meetinghouse with prayers of thanksgiving over a seven week period. We hope that you can come – and if not, we hope that you are praying with us at home and participating. We will walk a circle around the Meetinghouse: 7 circles equals 1 mile. Meditate and pray as you walk.

We will have seven meditation/topic stations. The "kickoff" service outside took place on September 26. We will conclude our season of gratitude circling on November 7th in the afternoon. If you haven't already, go to our website to look at the artfully crafted flyer with information, scriptures and meditations. (Huge thank you to Paul Lindemann.)

Pastor Deborah will be on vacation Sunday, October 18th. The Deacons decided that we will offer you the opportunity to go to the virtual worship of a different church on that day. You may have noticed that we have hosted folks from Atkinson and Brentwood. In the email you receive on October 16th, you will have several choices of services to attend. This is a wonderful opportunity for us!

We decided not to pursue in-person worship for the time being. In November, we will discuss this further. We have even begun to think about Christmas. We are prayerfully considering how to provide a meaningful in-person Christmas Eve celebration. We must maintain safety. More information about this will follow.

Don't forget to read your newsletters each month. There is a lot going on. Michelle does a great job putting all of these details together. Thank you Michelle!


Praying Circles of Gratitude Around the Meetinghouse until November 7th

Come with us on our path! Walk with us from chaos to peace! Tuesdays ~ through November 24th 6:00pm


You are welcome to join us each week, or just once.

October 11th Outdoor Worship Service 8:30am and Virtual Worship Service 10:00am Zoom & Facebook

On October 11th there will be an outdoor in person service at the church at 8:30am. Please note that **there** will be a virtual 10:00 service, as well. Virtual Service only. The early service will last about 30 minutes. The rain date is September 20th.

In this era of pandemic and in order to comply with safety recommendations, this service will look a little different from what we are used to.

- Any person displaying Covid-19 symptoms would be encouraged to stay home.
- There won't be any singing or use of instruments that use human breath.
- There will not be a unison prayer.
- If you need to use the restroom, only 2 people will be permitted to go into the building at any one time (or 1 family unit).
- There will be alcohol-based hand sanitizer available to use.
- We will not be shaking hands or hugging. Masks must be worn at all times.
- You will bring your own chair to sit on or a blanket to sit on. Please allow 6 feet between families.
- Children will remain with their families throughout the service and we ask that everyone remain seated.

October 7th Outdoor Vespers Service 6:00pm

Please join us for a quiet evening prayer service near the brick memorial garden. Wednesday, October 7th.

"Vespers" is the term used by many churches.

It comes from the Latin word for 'evening'.

Bring your own chair. Please wear a mask. We will maintain social distance.

And we will pray together and give God thanks.



First Parish Congregational Church History

The oldest church in the immediate area, First Parish Church was founded by Scotch-Irish Presbyterians in the spring of 1719. Faith was and continues to be a priority. Worship was held one day after arrival, a church body was organized in one month and a building was built in 1722. A "more imposing structure" replaced the first in 1769, and although altered and expanded through time, the main building and sanctuary remain our center of worship.
