From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Child of God,

Several weeks ago the Rev. Dr. David Reynolds came and offered an intense workshop entitled "Healthy Conflict!?" I noticed right away that those two words wouldn't necessarily go together in my head – and that's why I also appreciated the punctuation: both an exclamation mark AND a question mark. Dr. Reynolds invited us to consider that conflict is normal. We aren't a "bad" church because we are experiencing conflict. The early church experienced plenty of conflict. It's how we "respond" to conflict that is crucial. Our response can be healthy and it can be less than healthy, Dr. Reynolds posited.

We began with a lectio divina of I Corinthians 12:12-20. This is a wonderful exercise. God's Spirit was felt in palpable ways. In our sharing we noted that diversity and unity *can* coexist. All parts are equally important. Each part needs to understand the role of a different part. All of the different parts are needed and when one part suffers, many suffer.

We then looked at conflict in a little more detail. Conflict is caused by anxiety and anxiety is a reaction to a real or perceived threat. Conflict is not bad or good; it is very normal. When we hold in tension the threat with the fact that we are connected, we can find resolution and we can preserve the relationship. Unfortunately, human beings can, when feeling threatened, revert to a fight-flight mode. Dr. Reynolds called this "reptile brain." Perceived threats are internalized and taken personally. People forget our covenant to interconnectedness within the community. People forget that as the Body of Christ we are interrelated. In a Christian organization, the intention is to preserve the relationship. In order to do that, we must understand what is happening in our midst.

The healthy ways to address conflict are to stay connected, to calmly speak your truth, to manage your own anger and remember to breathe. It is healthy to speak directly to the person with whom you have felt the threat. (It is also Biblical: Matthew 18:15) It is healthy to speak your truth AND to listen to the beloved other speak theirs. It is healthy and honest to say "I have a different opinion." Or "I disagree." Direct communication does not always lead to agreement but it can lead to peaceful compromise. In summary, there are three key behaviors that are healthy: speak directly to the person who has hurt you; stay in the relationship; and be calm, breathe, and manage your reactivity.

Then Dr. Reynolds talked about the ways in which real or perceived threats taken personally can lead us to less healthy behaviors. Speaking directly to the person is healthy and speaking *about* the person is not. These are called "triangles" in therapy circles. In church circles we call them "parking lot conversations". These conversations are not direct, they are not healthy and they are not Christ-like. Another unhealthy behavior is to scapegoat. That is to say, blaming or pointing a finger at one person or group of persons, convincing anyone who will listen that "it's all their fault." And a third unhealthy behavior is to refuse any responsibility and to exit the situation or community. His list of three unhealthy behaviors was: speaking to someone about someone (triangles), scapegoating, or "cut off".

I think about the ways in which I have exhibited healthy behaviors and the ways in which I have exhibited unhealthy behavior. My intention has always been to do God's will and I am human. Moving forward I will work to do what is in my power to preserve relationship whenever possible. Sunday mornings are such a blur with so much going on. My goal is to be more intentional during the week to have more conversations with more people, not just the people that I see in Bible Wonder and book classes. You'll be hearing from me! We are One Spirit; we are One Body.




One Church. One Body. Celebrate!

The food from the food basket alternates between the Derry Food Pantry and the Upper Room, both important programs supported by your missions giving. Donations are desperately needed and always appreciated.

<u>Derry Friendship Center:</u> On Sunday, May 21st the Board of Christian Outreach and Missions hosted Carol Bowden from the Derry Friendship Center to hold a question and answer session after service for those interested in learning more about its mission. For this event we had approximately 30 people participate. The Derry Friendship Center is one of many charities your Missions giving supports. For over 30 years the Derry Friendship Center has provided a safe, confidential, alcohol and drug free environment for people seeking and/or maintaining recovery from substance abuse and to participate in activities and ongoing rehabilitative peer support to people in recovery from alcoholism and drug abuse.

In an ongoing effort to provide information to the Congregation concerning the charities their Mission pledging supports, we host one charity every couple of months. We invite the Congregation to participate in these events after service where lunch is typically served.

<u>Project Linus:</u> The Board of Christian Outreach and Missions has voted to support Project Linus. Project Linus gives quilts, lap through twin size, quilted, crocheted, knitted or tied, to children who have experienced a trauma. It could be sickness, fire, foster child, etc. there are only 2 drop offs in NH: one in Keene & one in Deerfield. There will be more information available over the next couple of months concerning this program and how we can support it. (See pg 5 for photo)

Historical Preservation Committee

Early Nutfield Families

Some people like history because it helps explain how things happened and provides context to our world. Some people simply like the interesting stories and notable characters. Some people like history that connects directly to their lives—whether it is historical information about their town, school, or home, or if it is information about a particular person, perhaps, one of their ancestors.

In mid-May, I had the good fortune to help a couple from California who had stopped by First Parish Church on their way to Forest Hill Cemetery looking for the graves of several people from the Gilmore (also spelled, Gillmore) family. They had good interactions with everyone they met at First Parish, and they had a photocopy of the layout of the Cemetery from a survey from a notebook that a boy scout had made in the 1980s. We were able to find the plot and several of the gravestones they were looking for in particular.

There are other sources that are useful for locating gravestones. One is the website, "Find A Grave" (https://www.findagrave.com/). Another tool is being developed by someone affiliated with the Derry Public Works department who is using a GIS program to plot locations of gravestones. (I will supply the URL in a future newsletter post.)

The Gilmores weren't among the very earliest families to settle Nutfield, but the Gilmores are listed among the "early settlers" in Edward Parker's book, *History of Londonderry*.

Here are the names of the 16 earliest families to settle Nutfield:


