Christian Education and Faith Formation


HAPPY NEW YEAR AND BLESSINGS FOR A JOYOUS, PEACEFUL AND HAPPY NEW YEAR!

Another Deacon said that "My favorite part about being a Deacon is greeting new members on Sunday mornings. Even through the pandemic, seeing people on Zoom and Facebook has been fun. Meetinghouse Preservation Update

With fantastic financial support mainly from the congregation, we were able to execute the two projects targeted for 2021:

- We completed the Accessibility Connector building shell that we constructed in 2016. This brilliant accessibility solution is essential for our getting back into the Sanctuary, as it provides an additional fire escape and new, easy access for every person (and coffins). Our excellent contractors applied materials and finishes inside and out and installed the elevator. We now wait for town and state inspections and certifications and hope to have a Connector Grand Opening ceremony late January.
- We had the Meetinghouse exterior repaired, scraped, caulked, and painted. Last painted quickly a decade ago, it was critical to preserving the building that we got it protected before this winter. We worked with a professional lead paint abatement firm and an experienced painting contractor who applied an oil-based primer and two coats of premium latex paint. (The south and east walls still need a second coat of color, which the contractor will apply in the spring.)

Good stewardship is essential for preserving the considerable historic preservation work we've already completed. Supporting this, in December we completed a thorough Annual Inspection Report with written and photographic documentation of all aspects of the Meetinghouse. While needed to meet our LCHIP grant obligations, this is also a good practice in helping the church acknowledge and plan for regular maintenance and repair requirements.

With 2021's efforts behind us, the BAC will resume detailed planning of the Sanctuary Rehab effort this month. Specific projects will include:

- Pew removal, storage, refurbishment, and later re-installation;
- Ceiling lead paint abatement, repairs, and painting;
- Asbestos floor tiles encapsulation and new hard flooring and carpeting installation;
- Historic plaster walls repair and all walls and appropriate trim prepped and painted;
- Electrical, lighting, and fire alarm systems updates;
- Provisions for multimedia systems to enable broader use of the building;
- Cushions and furnishings cleaned and prepared for use; and
- Organ pipes, basement air turbine, chimes, and keyboard console refurbished as necessary and all reinstalled to ready the 1959 pipe organ for Sunday services.

This work is a significant challenge to plan and execute, and the costs are likely to be \$500K - \$800K. Still, we take confidence in already having completed many preservation projects that were similarly challenging. And in the continued support of our passionate congregation.

The oldest church in the immediate area, First Parish Church was founded by Scotch-Irish Presbyterians in the spring of 1719. Faith was and continues to be a priority. Worship was held one day after arrival; a church body was organized in one month and a building was built in 1722. A "more imposing structure" replaced the first in 1769, and although altered and expanded through time, the main building and sanctuary remain our center of worship.
