From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Child of God,

When the angel of the Lord appeared to Mary with some really big news, Mary "pondered these things in her heart." I have tried to do more and more "pondering in my heart". In both Mary and my case, **prayer** is also part of this process of "pondering". Let's call it "prayerful pondering".

Recently, I have been prayerfully pondering" a lot about "community". What do we mean when we say "community"? What does "community" mean? So, of course, I went to the dictionary, which gives these two definitions:

- 1. a group of people living in the same place or having a particular characteristic in common.
- 2. a feeling of fellowship with others, as a result of sharing common attitudes, interests, and goals. You can classify every type of community by the purpose that brings them together:
 - 1. Interest. Communities of people who share the same interest or passion.
 - 2. Action. Communities of people trying to bring about change.
 - 3. Place. Communities of people brought together by geographic boundaries.
 - 4. Practice. Communities of people in the same profession or undertake the same activities.
 - 5. Circumstance. Communities of people brought together by external events/situations.

We have our "community of faith" here at First Parish Church, where we know that "all are welcome, no matter where they are on life's journey". Does the "community" in which we live know that we are here? A recent guest to our worship shared with me that they have been looking all year for a church. As a

"community of faith", how well do we participate in the community in which we are located so that those who are looking for a church like us, can indeed find us? I know that we are not the kind of Christian who knocks on doors and says, "Do you love Jesus?" So, what kind of Christian are we?

Prayerful pondering.

How often do we support other communities of faith? We certainly support St Thomas' fish fry during Lent. I stick out but do the Knights of Columbus recognize that you are from First Parish? And Miss Christine is proposing that a group of us go together to the Hampstead UCC Strawberry Festival. (Watch for announcements on this.)

Prayerful pondering.

Has there been an opportunity where our community of faith can work cooperatively with other communities in our area? I prayerfully ponder.

Some folks have approached me and have expressed interest in turning our wooded area into a "community pocket park". Many of you are saying "what wooded area?" because First Parish has never accepted the Stewardship of this gift from God that is right here. Many people don't know that First Parish owns that land. (I checked with the town. We do.) Within our church structure who has the authority to grant this type of project? Do we – as a community – have the energy to take on a project like this?

Prayerful pondering.

What does "community pocket park" mean? What would that look like? What if the Boy Scouts were invited to participate? And the Girl Scouts? And the Recovery group that meet in our building? And Boys and Girls Club? Taylor Library? And the "Kids Coop Theatre Studios" across the street? Or Upper Room teens? Pinkerton groups? Derry Garden Club? Imagine how beautiful the area would be with some sweat equity and attention. Imagine how beautiful it would be to work cooperatively with other "communities" to create something together. If you still don't know what I'm talking about, go to google maps, using the satellite function and look at how large that wooded area is. You will be as astounded as I was.

This is just one example. What can you imagine that would bring our community together with other communities? Jesus believed in building community through relationship. How might we do that?

I recently read an article that Albert Einstein understood that almost all highly creative and successful people do: they imagine! The imaginal realm is where the most potent ideas—the ones that can change your life or change the world—are held. And the more you can nurture your imagination by diving into that imaginal realm, the more often that dive will inspire a stream of creativity when you resurface. As Christians, we add prayer and then watch what God will do!

I invite you to spend some time in prayerful pondering.


"Art In the Park: Intergenerational Outdoor Creativity" Summer Program ~ For All Ages;

The journey of doubt through Perplexity involves questioning not only specific beliefs but the whole belief system approach to faith. Then, the journey into Harmony is a journey beyond beliefs into revolutionary love."

Path to the Sanctuary Update

There are many exciting things happening as we seek to finish our Sanctuary project, an arduous task for sure. First, we would like to thank Paul Lindemann for everything he does but especially, of late, updating the church website on our overall progress. This helps to keep the community informed and hopefully interested. Secondly, we want to thank the Fundraising Committee for offering to help us in our endeavor with ideas and labor. And certainly, but not at all last, to all who have been pledging to move us every closer to the final goal.

As of May 24, we have 16 pledges. If all come in as promised for 2022 we will have \$126, 210 which will start the process of laying plywood over the floor. For next year we have \$50,980 pledged. We have received \$3,000 in honor and memory of Ruthlee Root. Finally, there is the generous offer of a matching pledge up to \$100,000 and we have received commitments of \$36,900 toward that amount so far and hope that more will come in.

These are huge strides, but we are obviously not done. We are planning some exciting upcoming community events to help raise funds for the Meetinghouse rehabilitation. We understand this has been a long road back to the sanctuary, but we have made great progress. We pray you can all continue to help this beloved church utilize the Meetinghouse once again.

For many years here at First Parish, our worship bulletins have included a quote from a 12th Century Church in Hampshire, England: "Friend, you enter this church not as a stranger, but as a guest of God. Come, then, with joy in your heart and thanks upon your lips and offer God today your love and your service." Relationship with God means relationship with other believers.

The pandemic has taught has to enlarge our definition of "church" and to understand that we are members of a global community. We rejoice in our on-going relationship with Dr. Kennedy Gondongwe, from the United Theological Seminary in Harare, Zimbabwe.

We also have a sister church in Dangamvura – a UCC church - who enthusiastically hopes to connect with our church. With "joy in our hearts and thanks on our lips", perhaps we might nurture the gift of friendship with members of the Dangamvura congregation.

Our Mission Board and Pastor Deborah have corresponded with Pastor Joshua who was called upon to add Dangamvura to his schedule. We can do so much more! The Mission Board and Pastor Deborah are encouraging communication member to member.

We have just received several individuals in Dangamvura who wish to begin writing, share stories and sending photos.

Do you think you might enjoy doing this?

There is a free app that can be downloaded to your phone or device that is used extensively in other countries. It's called "Whatsapp". It's free. Nearly everyone uses it. Here is the list of folks who wish to connect with us:

- A grandmother with 4 grandchildren and 2 sons. The grandchildren: 3 are boys 2, 5 and 6 and 1 granddaughter age 4.
- a young woman (age 22) who is a student at Mutare Polytechnic. She will graduate in November. Her studies are Tourism and Hospitality Management.
- A woman age 36 /married and home with her 2 children, boy age 6 and girl age 4. She has a master's degree in Agriculture.
- A woman age 30 / married with 2 children age 2 and 4. She is a teacher in a rural school.
- A man age 42 / married with a son age 2 ½

Invitation to Star Island

Star Island is part of the Isle of Shoals about an hour by boat off the coast of Portsmouth, NH and is home to the shared UU and UCC Conferences as a retreat center. Many of our church family have been making a pilgrimage of sorts to our Star Island home over Labor Day weekend for the Star Gathering Family Weekend Retreat for many years.

On island there is a wide range of accommodations including the grand old Oceanic Hotel which also houses the dining hall, main lobby with its main desk and communication hub, a gift shop, a bookstore, a snack bar, and a huge wraparound porch lined with rockers. You'll see people gathering in small groups with old and new friends, chatting, or reading, or doing a craft, or just soaking in the view and the fresh salt air off the ocean. Other accommodations include single, double, and triple rooms in cottages and motel units all connected to the main hotel building by wooden porches also lined with rockers.

The conference fee of \$50 per person covers expenses of the conference, while your room and board charge covers your room and three hearty meals each day served either family style or by servers at buffet tables, depending on Covid protocols at the time. Prices also include the boat ride out and back on the Thomas Leighton. Room and board prices range from \$391-\$933, depend on type of lodging you request, whether you come on Friday for three nights, or Saturday for 2 nights, and whether you choose a single or shared room. On Sunday night you can also order a lobster dinner for an additional charge. There is also a block of funds set aside to offer financial aid to make the Star Island experience more accessible to everyone, so don't let financial barriers get in the way.

Our theme this year is Nurturing Self: Body, Mind, and Spirit. Our theme speaker is Jen Messner, a nutritionist and healer who will be offering at least three different workshop sessions over the weekend. There are lots of activities planned that you can participate in including Jen's workshops, making sea glass windows, an ice cream social, doing a skit or sharing a special talent in the talent show, evening chapel by candlelight, kayaking in sheltered Gosport Harbor, a morning Polar Plunge or swimming later in the day, hiking around the island. Or you can spend time just relaxing, reading, journaling, rocking on the porch, napping, chatting with friends, or just lazing in the sun with a lime Rickey or an ice cream from the snack bar.

We hope you will join us this year as we gather on Star Island to create beloved community yet again! If you have any questions, any of us would be more than happy to talk with you.

Spring Fling


This report is a result of the Spring Fling that occurred on Saturday, May 21st.

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Family Promise of Southern New Hampshire-Update

There's a lot to report on Family Promise these days. First, our church was represented at Family Promise's major donor event on Wed May 17 by 3 of our consistent contributors to the meal we provide to the 70+ Family Promise guests the first Thursday of every month—Carol Guerrin, Nancy Murdock, and Karen Wilson. The dinner, held at the LaBelle winery in Amherst, was focused solely on acknowledging and honoring the many people and companies that make sizeable contributions of money and time to support this very worthwhile program to serve homeless families. We are proud that our church is part of this incredible community of giving people and organizations. It was truly inspiring to hear about 3 current or former families who have been residents at Family Promise. One, Andy Cuthbertson, was a single Dad with sole custody of 2 boys. After 2 years in the program in 2015-2017, he now owns his own home and was selected as the volunteer of the year for the time he now gives back to the program. Despite nearly dying from Covid last year, he was able to keep up his mortgage payments. Another moving moment was when one of the mothers currently in the program could not contain her tears at the end of the evening ceremony as she came (unplanned) to the microphone to thank the people in the room for all they have done for her family. A truly humbling moment for everyone. And finally, a long-time volunteer and former board member told of having just received an invitation to the graduation ceremony at Dartmouth Medical College for a young man who 15 years or so earlier had been a Family Promise resident, with his homeless parents. These stories vividly illustrate why Family Promise is such a needed organization, and why our church and many individual members of our congregation support it with our time and money.

The second piece of news about Family Promise is that we are trying to create in Derry a facility similar to the one in Nashua. We are in the process of purchasing the Holy Cross church on East Derry Road, only a few miles from our own church, and converting it into 16 2-bedroom units. The purchase of the property, which has not been used as church for a few years, is essentially completed, but is contingent on getting a favorable ruling from the Derry Zoning Commission for this alternative use of the property. While many people spoke in support of it, 3 people living adjacent to the church property oppose it. We are trying to assure them that their fears, while valid for some types of supportive housing, will not be issues for this particular facility, given its small size and the hands-on way we will manage it.

Finally, we continue to cook, deliver, and serve a delicious meal for the families in residence, on the first Thursday of every month.
