From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Child of God,

By way of introduction to my message this month, allow me to share that I am sensing an apprehension in the air around me – at church, at stores, at restaurants. So much to do. So many conflicting messages. So much going on. And while this is true, it is also true that each one of us at any given moment can stop and pay attention to the beauty and glory that surrounds us right now. In moments of despair, there are angels of mercy. In times of disaster, look for the helpers. Choose to see God and God is there.

With Fall upon us, we see the colors changing. We feel the temperatures falling. The birds and butterflies begin to gather and begin their southern journeys. Sports programs ramp up again. Children begin another academic year both at school and at church. And it's not just the children, because the adults reengage with our Adult Faith offerings and check their calendars for the Patriots games. The Deacons and I talked about receiving new members in October. New beginnings. They surround us. What also surrounds us is the vast array of emotions that accompany all these activities. I was reminded of an amazing poem last week. The title is "Guest House" and the poet is Rumi. I'll share it with you here:

'This being human is a guest house. Every morning a new arrival. A joy, a depression, a meanness, some momentary awareness comes As an unexpected visitor. Welcome and entertain them all! Even if they're a crowd of sorrows, who violently sweep your house empty of its furniture, still treat each guest honorably. He may be clearing you out for some new delight. The dark thought, the shame, the malice, meet them at the door laughing and invite them in. Be grateful for whoever comes, because each has been sent as a guide from beyond."

"From beyond"... For followers of Jesus through our relationship with God and Christ, we have a keen awareness that God is actively in our lives and in everything we do. We forget sometimes, though. It happens. And we need reminders – like this poem or perhaps from scripture.

Sacred scripture (and the Byrds in the 60's) says "for everything there is a season... and a time for every activity under heaven." (Ecclesiastes 3) Breathe in this message and know that *God is with you*. Resist getting overwhelmed by people and schedules. *All shall be well*. Take a moment every now and then to just be present to the exact time and place where you are. In so doing, you will follow the wisdom of the mystics. Take note of your "here" and your "now". And breathe.

Salt* THEOLOGIAN'S ALMANAC October DID YOU KNOW......?

October 2 is the birthday of Mohandas Gandhi, a religious and civic leader born in India in 1869, best known for his role in India's independence movement against British colonial rule, and particularly for his promotion of nonviolence as a means of resistance and liberation. He influenced Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s interests in nonviolence; King kept a portrait of Gandhi in his study. Gandhi wrote, "The weak can never forgive. Forgiveness is an attribute of the strong."

October 4 is the Feast Day of St. Francis of Assisi, born in 1182, today considered the patron saint of animals and the natural world. He was a friar — a kind of monk who lived not in a monastery but rather among the poor out in the world.

October 6 is the day in 1683 the first Mennonites arrived in what would become the United States. Francis Daniel Pastorius, a German lawyer and teacher, founded Germantown in Pennsylvania. After eating with a group of Native Americans, Pastorius wrote that they "have never in their lives heard the teaching of Jesus concerning temperance and contentment, yet they far excel the Christians in carrying it out." In 1688, he wrote to slave-holding Quakers in Germantown, urging them to free the people they were enslaving — the first formal abolitionist protest by European immigrants in the American colonies.

October 7 is the birthday of Desmond Tutu, born in Klerksdorp, South Africa, in 1931. For his leadership in opposing apartheid in South Africa, he was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1984; two years later, he elected to be the first black archbishop of Cape Town, the head of the country's Anglican Church. In 1995, President Nelson Mandela appointed Tutu to lead the Truth and Reconciliation Committee, investigating apartheid-era human rights abuses. Tutu said: "How does peace come? Peace doesn't come because allies agree. Allies are allies — they already agree! Peace comes when you talk to the guy you most hate. And that's where the courage of a leader comes."

October 8 is the day in 1971 that John Lennon released his second solo album, Imagine. The title track was the best-selling song of his solo career. It's often understood as anti-religious ("...no religion too..."), but Lennon insisted otherwise. He and Yoko Ono had received a prayer book, he explained, and that book inspired him to write the song as a kind of "positive prayer." He put it this way: "If you can imagine a world at peace, with no denominations of religion — not without religion but without this my-God-is-bigger-than-your-God thing — then it can be true."

Kairos - A Prison Ministry

Matthew 25:35 – 36 – Jesus said:

³⁵ for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, ³⁶ I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, <u>I was in prison and you visited me</u>."

A MESSAGE FROM MIKE SCHROEDER

I'm getting ready to go to prison. I will spend 3-1/2 days behind the walls, along with about 21 other volunteers. We'll be in the Federal Corrections Institution in Concord, New Hampshire starting on October 20th and ending on October 23th.

The Kairos Prison Ministry is an amazingly effective program to bring the love of God into the lives of some of those who need it most. The experience of helping those men is a great blessing, but I don't do it for me, or even for them, I do it on behalf of our Lord Jesus. Matthew 25:36 doesn't just apply to "somebody" it applies to us all. But you don't have to "visit me in prison" yourself directly, you can support me as I go in on your behalf.

How can you help?

- 1. You can volunteer to be a team member. It may seem scary to go into prison, but I've done it dozens of times, and I can attest to the fact that it is nothing to be feared.
- 2. You can volunteer to serve as support staff. You don't have to go into prison to volunteer, there are many jobs available on the outside.
- 3. You can be a prayer Partner. Sign up to pray for us on the weekend.
- 4. And of course, we are always in need of donors. Kairos is a very good steward of funds, but it isn't cheap to provide the valuable services of Kairos to prisons at no cost to the prison.

Board of Facilities

Happy Fall from the Facilities Board! We have been working on several projects that do not always show a physical improvement for you to see:

- Our previously used underground oil tank will be removed by a contractor on October 6, 2022. You
 may see some disruption in the walkway/parking lot surface and the memorial garden outside the
 Pastor's office. We will do our best to minimize any disruption. The wood from the tree that was cut
 down has been saved for the church and we hope it will be used to create some form of
 memorial/recognition from the previously planted tree.
- Facilities has been working on replacing certain pieces of exterior trim that are rotting. The most visible is at the Currier entrance where the trim goes up the ramp and around/above the doors.
- New closet doors were painted and mounted in the Noyes hallway to the connector.
- A doorbell has been installed at the Currier entrance and rings in the office.
- We are in the process of getting new quotes for maintenance of all our Fire Safety systems, including our new Fire alarm system, fire extinguishers, and kitchen hood suppression systems.
- The fencing along the road has been removed and will not be replaced.
- The bushes around our FPC sign in front were extensively trimmed to make our sign more visible.
- Future activities include: Fall Cleanup by the Boy Scouts scheduled for November, review of current contract and 2nd quote for snow removal, continued replacement of fluorescent lighting to LED lighting, and our next primary project will be upgrading our keyed entry system into facility.

ELECTRONIC GIVING - Venmo Announcement

VENMO IS NOW AVAILABLE TO MAKE FINANCIAL DONATIONS TO FIRST PARISH CHURCH

Anyone can now use **Venmo** to make contributions to the church via credit card (3% fee applied), debit card (no fee), or direct transfer (no fee) from their checking account directly into the church's account. Having this option makes things simpler for congregation members, friends, and visitors who wish to contribute in this way and could attract contributions from community members who visit our website or know about our activities.

To experience these benefits of Venmo (the most widely used of these electronic transfer services) while avoiding the drawbacks, you will need to follow these procedures:

- 1. Download the Venmo app on your phone. Click "pay". Type in @first-parish. Fill in the blank labelled "what's it for" (VERY IMPORTANT). Examples are: general fund, mission, building rehabilitation, Christian Ed. The contribution can also be split among these categories in any desired proportion that you specify. You must also indicate if this is payment toward a previously made pledge or is a new, separate contribution—e.g., "October pledge toward operating budget."
- 2. Click on the button labelled "public," which is the default. That will then give you the option to restrict who sees that you made a contribution to the church. If you don't do this, anyone who uses Venmo can see that you made a contribution to the church (but not the amount).
- 3. Enter the amount. Then enter your payment info (checking account number if that's what you choose, debit card (no fee charged), or a credit card (3% fee). Once you've done this once, it will show up as a payment option for you to choose.

If a contribution is made that does not contain the required information about what it's for, Julie Greenfield, a member of the finance committee, will call you for clarification. Please be respectful of her time by always indicating exactly what your payment is for, so that she does not have to call you. If you cannot be reached, the default for your payment will be that it will go into the general fund as a new contribution, not payment of an existing pledge.

Only members may serve on one of our five Boards or Council. To become a member, we ask that you identify your wish to serve God in this way by affirming your baptism. For anyone who has not been baptized, Pastor Deborah will baptize you first. There will be some conversations about what membership entails and how we function as a church. The oldest church in the immediate area, First Parish Church was founded by Scotch-Irish Presbyterians in the spring of 1719. Faith was and continues to be a priority. Worship was held one day after arrival; a church body was organized in one month and a building was built in 1722. A "more imposing structure" replaced the first in 1769, and although altered and expanded through time, the main building and sanctuary
