From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Child of God,

"April showers bring May flowers." I have always loved that expression! It's pretty true. It rains a lot in April and there are flowers to show for it in May. I also like that expression because it legitimizes the rainy days, which are crucial to future blooms. Those rainy, soggy days are not for no reason. They mean something. And those beautiful flowers – the bright yellow daffodils and dandelions who come first. And then the red tulips - and every other color tulip! We look forward to the magenta of the azaleas and purple rhododendron, followed by the lilacs in every shade of purple! And what about those leaves on the trees! From one day to the next, buds fill up and burst forth new leaves. All because Mother Earth is getting a giant drink of water, mixed with a sunshine that is getter warmer every day.

Is it a coincidence that Easter falls in Springtime? Probably – and who can resist the question? Easter is that time of year when believers remember the resurrection and dwell on the wonder of a new life promised by our Creating God: creating, re-creating and ever-creating. New life. New decisions. New choices. Sometimes you can just smell the newness of the air as it warms and promises us the new hope of all potentiality and wondrous promise.

The thing is that every day is a new day, and every day offers new possibilities. In a way, that's what resurrection represents: a complete break with any past mistakes or former poor choices. Things can be different if and when we choose. How many times during one day do you "replay" an event or situation from the past? We replay it and replay it and replay it in our mind. And all the while wishing that it had been different. We remember losses. We remember resentments. We remember the pain or the betrayal or the defeat. We live in the past.

And it's Spring. What if we consider what happened in the past to be the necessary "rainfall" in order for us to *bloom*? What if every time we started to replay one of those scenarios from our past, we stopped ourselves and asked the question: what would I like to have happen? What if rather than living in a constant revolving door of memories, we lived in visions of what we imagine for ourselves? A few years ago, a member of the church gave me a book by Wayne Dyer: "Change Your Thoughts, Change Your Life." What if you changed your thoughts? How would your life change?

During Lent this year, I encouraged everyone to be mindfully kind and compassionate to *themselves*. I had noticed how difficult we are on ourselves and how self-deprecating we can be at times. So, I created a calendar and for 40 days, you were encouraged to notice something positive. Only a few people reported to me that they tried. I'm hoping that many more of you at least thought about it, even if you didn't report back to me. It was hard, wasn't it? It is extremely difficult to change our habits. And the thing is that if we don't change our habits, nothing will change – and then we will complain that good things elude us.

We must endure the rain if we want to enjoy the flowers. We all have endured life's difficulties. And the truth is that it is by our own thoughts, that we continue to relive those storms. Join me as I endeavor to envision a future that is much more grace-filled than the memories of my past. Replace past resentments with visions of meaningful moments in the future, where you can be who you dream of becoming.

Let's plant a garden together – filled with visions of a thriving community rooted in the love of Christ Jesus.

Continuing Progress with Meetinghouse Preservation

This past month, the lead paint stripping, minor repairs, and repainting of the Sanctuary's 1903 metal ceiling were completed to everyone's great satisfaction. The fantastic detail exposed by removing numerous past coats of paint is really beautiful.

Productive discussions amongst the Sanctuary Design Team are leading to requirements that will guide the renovation plans. Decisions so far include the need to support future worship services with multimedia and streaming capabilities, to add an accessibility ramp to the choir and pulpit platform, to add legroom to the pews by deleting one or two rows, to use half pew sections to leave scattered open areas for wheelchairs or children, and to significantly improve the lighting throughout. This critical high-level planning will continue.

We've been researching and starting to get advice and proposals from experts for the remaining Sanctuary projects: historic plaster repair; electrical, fire, and lighting system updates; new multimedia and streaming capabilities; and final materials and finishes. This work will help us make firm estimates for all the remaining costs and start to sort future project schedules.

One such expert has analyzed the Sanctuary floor structure and found its weight capacities are

below current building code standards. However, they also observed no stress or damage since the floor was installed in 1845, and admitted historic timber is stronger than current lumber. We will be working with various parties to determine the best path forward to a safe, strong, and legal floor.

Separate from the Sanctuary Rehab and its funding, we are working to move forward on restoring the tower clock functions: timekeeping on the three clock faces and hourly ringing of the bell. We won a \$7,000 grant for this from the Methuen Festival of Trees, and the remaining roughly \$9,000 will come from directed donations, mostly raised by the Friends of the Meetinghouse. More on this—and all our projects—next month.

Board of Missions

Your Mission Board has been busy this month reviewing some of our monthly disbursements and deciding where there may be more of a need at this particular time. We have some carry over money that should be disbursed over the next few months.

We began by looking globally and decided to send \$1000 to the New Hampshire UCC Global Mission specifically earmarked for the relief efforts in Turkey and Syria after the earthquake disaster. New Hampshire's funds are sent to the National office to be combined with all the contributions from churches all over the United States.

We also voted to increase our pledge to our sister church in Dangamvura, Zimbabwe from \$300 a year to \$500 a year. This is wired once a year directly to their pastor.

On the local front, a representative from the Derry Friendship Center spoke to our congregation in church on Sunday April 30. We support the Friendship Center on a monthly basis but we also presented them on Sunday with an additional check for \$500 to help offset the additional expenses they have had recently due to building repairs.

We are also investigating and exploring ways of perhaps becoming hands on involved in a program called NuDay. NuDay is a nonprofit organization that has been in Derry for about 10 years and is a clearing house for donations made by churches and other organizations around New England and supports people in Turkey and Syria. They ship anywhere from 1-3 containers of goods to the needy in Turkey and Syria a month. We are hoping to possibly organize groups of volunteers from First Parish in the future.

Next month we will continue to discuss other organizations we support and how we might best help them with their projects. As always, we welcome your suggestions and ideas.

Currently Pastor Deborah corresponds with Pastor Joshua who serves two churches right now. He walks 14 kilometers one way to do ministry among the folks in Dangamvura. He recently received word that he has been assigned there from 2024-2027.

There are several people in Dangamvura who would like to connect with someone here. Several members of FPC are active pen pals with a members of that church and there are several more folks over there who would like to correspond with someone here. Please consider becoming a "pen pal". There is a free app called "WhatsApp" that can be downloaded to your phone or device that is used extensively in other countries.

While we support them financially, and we have this handful of pen pals, what more might we do? We hope to see this program grow and to bring us closer together as we support their church with relationship and encouragement.

Granite Statesmen


