### From the Pastor's Desk

Philippians 4:8 "Finally, brothers and sisters,

whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things."

Dear Child of God,

You may recall that after Christmas, in the January newsletter or bulletin, I often quote the poem by Howard Thurman, "The Work of Christmas." If you do not recall it, allow me to refresh your memory. This poem encourages us to do the "work" of Christmas, even as the sights and sounds of Christmas fade and become fond memories. This Christmas "work" entails serving God's children by feeding the hungry and welcoming the stranger, among other deeds of faith.

The past Sunday we proclaimed: "He is risen! He is risen indeed!" For we are, in fact, now an Easter people. We are children of the empty tomb, witnesses to the resurrection. For us, resurrection is proof of tangible hope, and it is a witness to the power of love. Were we to imitate Thurman's poetic imagination, what, then, is the "work of Easter"? When "hosanna" is heard no more, when the nightmarish sounds of our Savior's limbs being nailed to the cross are but a faint memory, and when the reality of the empty tomb washes over us, what does God call us to do?

We are not like those disciples and friends who knew Jesus and walked with him during his life. We are not an occupied people, living under harsh Roman rule. Most people reading this newsletter have warm houses in which to live and available food when we are hungry. We have the freedom to worship the God of our understanding. We have the ability to work where we choose. We have the liberty to advance our careers in meaningful ways. Our hardships are not like those of first century Middle East, AND they are very real to us. Our burdens weigh us down and our struggles cripple us. Some days our loneliness is palpable. We may be living in the age of information, but we are barraged with data and dreadful predictions of things to come.

What hope is there when we continue to be divided and divisive? How do we live in a world of such mistrust and miscommunication? How? The Apostle Paul had some advice in Philippians 4:8. We must cling to the truth of the Easter story. It was out of love that God gave us God's loving Son. And it was out of love that Jesus lived his life and laid down his life for a purpose – us! And it was out of love that Jesus seeks relationship with each one of God's children. Jesus, who was and is the light of the world, shatters any tomb of loneliness, the way that he shatters any doubt we carry. The "work" of Easter is to live into hope beyond hope. The work of Easter is the flame of a faith more durable than fact. The work of Easter is to seek God and to find God in the midst of any noise and any dispute. The work of Easter is to keep the Sabbath sacred, to keep Sunday worshipful for all!

#### How?

We need to see an opportunity before us. We need to be intentional about it. And then we need to practice. We all need a time and a place where we can be totally attuned to all that is sacred. For many people, our worship on Sunday morning is the one opportunity to step away from the "world's work" and to step into God-time. Let's work to protect that time. We need to do everything in our power to keep Sunday sacred. It is a blessing that we are a very active church. Many people are doing many wonderful things. However, it is becoming more and more "convenient" to talk business on Sunday morning. And I fear that when this happens too often, Sunday loses its sacredness. I have observed that even the most faithful among us experience some hesitation about attending worship services, because someone will ask them to do one more thing. Their "sabbath time" is not being honored.

I would love to hear your thoughts about this intention. How do we keep the Sabbath sacred for our own faith community? How do we encourage activity all the while encouraging a depth of sacred practice? May God stir in your hearts this Eastertide and lead you in new and sacred practices.

### **Mission and Outreach**

Our own Beth Hunter made the Community Caregivers' 2023 Report. Thanks for all you do for our community, Beth!



The Outreach and Mission Board met on March 12, 2024. Financial information was reviewed and it was affirmed that Mission Board would support 4 scholarships for Horton Center (up to \$150 each).

Cyndi Gray reported that 68 Hours of Hunger is in good shape financially. The Mission Board will not be making a financial donation at this time. The Derry Lunch program has a debt of \$20,000 and it was decided not to contribute to this program as any donation we would make would have little impact. Other ways to support the school program will be investigated.

One Great Hour of Sharing (one of the 5 for 5 UCC efforts) was collected in March. This is when the coin boxes are provided to the children and the children of all ages. There were also envelopes for additional congregation contribution. The results will be reported from our April Mission Board meeting.

OCWM (Our Churches Wider Mission), is supported each month with a contribution. This pledge is handed in at the worship service at Prepared to Serve. We have been prayerful about our contribution since we haven't raised it in several years. After prayer and research, we did decide to raise it to a monthly gift of \$400. Our support of our denominational structure is so crucial. We hope to report to the congregation more specific examples of how this money helps us directly.

We try to report each month during the worship service during scheduled "Mission Moments" You pledge faithfully to Mission, and it is important that you know what your money is going. In case you've missed it, these are among the ministries and services that your Mission dollars support:

Community Caregivers, Derry Friendship Center, Sonshine Soup Kitchen, First Baptist Church Food Pantry, Family Promise of Southern New Hampshire, Upper Room Resource Center, Pinkerton Family Program, Pastoral Counseling Services (providing counseling to anyone who wishes a faith approach to talk therapy).

In addition to these local organizations, we also support the Pastor's Discretionary fund.

If you are wondering what the other three missions are in that "5 for 5" giving initiative: Strengthen the Church – which we talk about at Pentecost; Neighbors in Need – which is an October request and The Christmas Fund – which used to be called Veterans of the Cross, a fund to help retired clergy with limited resources.

We thank God for you because you take the Bible as seriously as we do: generosity and tithing a portion of our income is a time-honored, God-inspired act of faith. Thank you!

### An Ordination is Coming ... and you are invited!

For the past five years, Debbie Gline Allen has been working with our Rockingham Association Committee On Ministry to complete all of the steps required for becoming an ordained minister in the United Church of Christ (UCC). As of February 4th, after her Ecclesiastical Council ("final exam/dissertation," in English), she has been approved for ordination.

You are invited to attend this service of ordination on Sunday, April 28th at 3:00pm All ages are invited!

Since it has been a few decades since First Parish Church has hosted an ordination, here are the answers to some frequently asked questions about ordinations, and about this one in particular:

### I thought Debbie already was a minister. Why is she getting ordained?

Debbie is already a Commissioned Minister of Christian Formation in the UCC and has been for 32 years. But with some shifts in the understanding of ordination in the UCC, she has discerned that ordained ministry (ministry of the Word and Sacrament, i.e. a more generic ministry than commissioned ministry) is an appropriate and desired step to enhance and broaden her current ministry in Christian education and faith formation.

### What will happen at this service of ordination?

It will look much like a regular service of worship, complete with hymns, prayers, a sermon, and Communion, along with the ritual of ordination. Debbie is designing this service so that it will be welcoming for all ages. It will include a PrayGround area for children, beautiful images projected on the screens during the more wordy parts, lively hymns with jazz trumpet, and puzzle pieces (the purpose of which will be revealed during the service).

#### What does the ritual of ordination look like?

It involves inviting Debbie to make solemn promises as she enters ordained ministry, followed by the Laying on of Hands. This is a symbolic act where Debbie will kneel at the front, and all of the ordained ministers who are present will gather around her and place their hands on her shoulders. As this act has been practiced since the time of Jesus' apostles as they passed on ministerial authority to the Early Church leaders, it is a powerful symbol of affirmation from the Cloud of Witnesses of the Church throughout the ages. Everyone present will also be invited to place their hands on the people in front of them so that all may bless Debbie into her future ministry.


#### How long will the service last?

It could be as long as one and a half hours, but there will be lots to see and hear and participate in, so it should feel much shorter.

#### Will there be food?!

We hope you will come and represent First Parish Church at this service of ordination, as First Parish is the church where Debbie is not only a member, it is the church that called (hired) her to her first Christian education position and launched her on this exciting journey.

### First Parish Church's Identity Statements:

The United Church of Christ is guided by covenants rather than creeds. We don't tell you what you must believe. As an organization we discern how we see ourselves in God's Creation. We are then guided by various statements, which are voted upon by the entire congregation at a meeting called for that purpose. See below our Mission Statement, Our Open & Affirming Statement and our new Vision Statement.

#### **Mission Statement**

(Background: First Parish worked with nationally known consultant Alice Mann to discern who we were as a church. The result was the Mission Statement. Over the past decade leaders have looked at this statement to see if it still fits. It does and so it stands.)

"We are a community of faith built upon a firm foundation of worship, prayer, and education. In affirming diversity, we are dedicated to welcoming all people who seek the Word of God, Christian fellowship, and service to others. In partnership with Christ and led by the Holy Spirit, we reach out to the ever-widening community through active and loving ministry." (Adopted April 2000)

### **Open & Affirming Statement**

(Background: In 2013, First Parish underwent a dedicated study with the goal of discerning whether we felt called to become Open & Affirming. The result of that process was a vote to be listed as Open & Affirming and the following statement.)

"We affirm Christ's call to love God and love our neighbors as ourselves. We therefore pledge ourselves to be open to and affirming of all people of every age, race, ethnicity, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, physical or mental ability, socioeconomic status, family configuration, or cultural background. All who affirm the love of Christ in their lives are welcome into this community and to share fully in its life and ministry. We rejoice in the worth, gifts, and dignity of every person as a child of God." (Adopted January 2014)

#### **Vision Statement**

(Background: In 2023, the Council recognized that although we had a Mission Statement that we liked, we lacked a Vision Statement. The following is the result of this process.)

"To live our faith by being a compassionate, accepting, and generous presence in the community: a church where all people find purpose and belonging." (Adopted January 2024)
